**STORM WARNING SERVICE IS EXTENDED**

Revenue Cutters, Life Saving Stations and Light Houses Will Hereafter Display Flags.

Hereafter the Revenue Cutter service, the Life Saving Stations and Lighthouse service will co-operate with the Weather Bureau of the Department of Agriculture and display storm warning signals simultaneously with the display of such signals at the local observatories in sections that are expected to be affected by storms.

Storm warning flags have been supplied to the revenue cutter Penrose, on duty in this harbor, and hereafter, when storm warnings are displayed on the Custom House the vessel will carry duplicate of the signals on a mast when out in the bay. It is expected that the signals will also be flown from the Life Saving Station, that place having for some time been supplied with the necessary flags.

The new service will be of great value to shippers and seafaring people generally and will undoubtedly be appreciated by them.

**SECOND DAY OF WILLIAMS TRIAL**

(Continued From First Page.)

years, but did not know that he was ever shown any more favor than any other clerk.

Touching upon goods that were being taken from the store and not charged, he said his father had accused Williams of it, and that defendant had denied same. Witness did not hear all of talk between his father and Williams, as the latter asked for a private interview. This occurred about two weeks prior to the shooting and about the time that Edwin C. Danby and Chas. P. Bobe went to Century to see if any of the goods could be found.

**Took Williams to Task.**  
Witness said, he, as manager of the store, had upon the morning of the shooting called Williams to task for taking a light suit of clothing and a Panama hat from the store, and asked if it had been charged. Williams denied having had the goods, but told him that he had recently bought a blue suit of clothing, but had returned same and exchanged it for a suit he had worn at a recent entertainment. Witness had also taken Williams to task for receiving money for the store and not handing over the letter accompanying it. Upon being questioned by Judge Reeves witness stated that Williams was not shown any favoritism by his father, and when questioned about a suit of clothes prior to the last occasion had said he had given Henry White, who was absent from the city, the money for same.

Witness admitted that he had at one time permitted Williams to overdraw his personal account about \$20.00, and that as his father was very strict about such matters, he did not like to go to him about it. He said that the defendant, so far as he knew did not know that Danby and Bobe were going to Century. The witness was then adjourned.

**Little Done in Afternoon.**  
After the start that was made at the forenoon session in the Williams murder trial, it was thought by all that the fast work would continue during the afternoon, but within an hour after convening this afternoon the attorneys for the state began to object to testimony, with the result that only four witnesses were examined, and another witness was on the stand, namely C. P. Bobe, when the jury retired to allow the lawyers to make arguments on the admissibility of evidence regarding certain goods alleged to have been taken by Williams and sent to Century. This continued until 6 o'clock tonight, when court adjourned for a night session.

The witnesses examined were Frank Williams, colored, who was buying a trunk from Danby when the latter was shot; E. W. Elliott, bookkeeper, who saw John White killed, but did not stop to see anything further; Jas. R. Nix, who saw Williams have the revolver pointed towards John White, and then ran, and Robert McLellan, who assisted in taking the revolver from the grasp of Williams.

The night session, at which very little was done, adjourned about 10 o'clock. It is believed that all of the evidence will be concluded by tomorrow afternoon. Several of the witnesses left here tonight for Pensacola.
