The new home of the Pensacola Young Men's Christian Association will be dedicated tonight, the books will be opened for receiving members and the active work of the association will begin at once.

During the afternoon the association building will be open to the public and guides will be in attendance to conduct visitors through the building and to explain its various features; at seven thirty members of the young men's committee will be in attendance for the same purpose and at eight o'clock the formal exercises will begin.

Basket Ball Game.
After the dedication Mr. Magee, the physical director will be on the gymnasium floor to explain the various pieces of apparatus and then there will be a basket ball game.

The members of the young men's committee in attendance will have blank membership applications and every young man is given a cordial invitation to become a member of the association.

Full schedule of work has not yet been arranged, but the general plan is as follows:

Plan of Work.
The building will be open each week day from nine a. m. until ten p. m. On Sundays the building will be open only in the afternoon.

The physical department and game rooms will not be open on Sunday.
In the gymnasium the class work will be designed to meet the needs of the average man, giving special attention to the development of the vital organs and to health culture; there will be classes for the man who has never used a gymnasium and for the expert gymnast; there will be special classes and individual instruction in boxing and wrestling.

There will be athletic teams and track teams, instruction in a aquatics and games without number.
The physical director will give such members who wish to use the gymnasium a physical examination, furnish him a chart showing his measurements, will prescribe the exercises best suited to the individual and will give special prescriptive work for correcting any defects or deficiencies in physique.

The regulation gymnasium uniform will be black jersey and gray turned trousers.

Educational Department.
The reading room will be supplied with all the best periodical literature and daily papers and will be open to the public at all times.

A BIG RATTLER KILLED NEAR THE CITY

One Measuring Nearly Seven Feet Long Shot by Hunter at Oakfield.

Probably the largest rattlesnake ever killed in this section was brought to the city yesterday by G. W. Ridlehoover, who resides at Oakfield, and who killed the reptile near that place. The snake measured exactly six and a half feet in length. It had fourteen rattles and a button and probably measured about twenty inches in circumference.

Mr. Ridlehoover was out quail hunting yesterday and was in some thick underbrush when his dog stopped suddenly as though it was going to hunt a quail. A moment afterwards the hunter saw something moving through the weeds and thinking the movement was caused by running quails, fired in that direction. Afterwards when he went to the spot he found that he had killed a big rattler. He brought the snake to the city yesterday, and it was placed on exhibition on Palafox street.

SOLIDIFICATION OF HEMISPHERE

Chicago, Dec. 7.—A dispatch to the Tribune from Washington, D. C., says: There is a world of policies in Secretary Root's determination to visit Brazil next summer. Its result, it is hoped, will be a hemisphere solidified against European aggression.

This was revealed by an official acquainted with the reasons underlying the secretary's decision as proposed by his trip, as follows:

First to show the people of Brazil and other South American Republics that the United States does not assume the role of protector, but considers that the states of the new world should enjoy absolute equality with each other.

Second, to demonstrate that the United States thinks enough of their friendship and good will to warrant attentions such as one nation of Europe shows to another.

Third, by personal explanation to remove a suspicion that territorial aggrandizement is the secret main-spring of the policy of the United States.

Fourth, from this demonstration of the friendship and good will and acknowledgment of equality to obtain a recognition of the obligations as well as benefits which the Monroe doctrine impress upon the Latin-American states, and to insure their cordial support of it. In other words to have an unwritten alliance of the states of the Western Hemisphere, the purpose of which shall be the enforcement of the Monroe doctrine against the world.

STANTON'S KIND HEART.

Two Incidents That Show His Tenderness and Consideration.

Edwin M. Stanton, secretary of war during and after the civil war, impressed many who came to him with appeals for aid as a stern and even heartless man. He was frequently contrasted with President Lincoln as his very opposite in mercy and gentleness. Yet incidents described to his latest biographer by men who knew him well show that he sometimes suffered as bitterly as those whose requests he felt compelled to refuse.

"I went to the war office after 10 o'clock one night to consult Mr. Stanton," says a former clerk. "I found the mother, wife and children of a soldier who had been condemned to be shot as a deserter on their knees before him, pleading for the life of their loved one. He listened, standing, in cold and austere silence. At the end of their heart-breaking sobs and prayers he answered briefly that the man must die. The crushed and gasping little family left, and Mr. Stanton turned, apparently unmoved, and walked into his private room.

"My own heart was wrung with anguish. It seemed to me that Mr. Stanton must be a demon, the very incarnation of cruelty and tyranny.

"I was so dazed that, forgetting myself, I followed him into his office without rapping. I found him leaning over a desk, his face buried in his hands and his heavy frame shaken with sobs.

"God help me to do my duty! God help me to do my duty!" he was repeating in a low wail of anguish that I shall never forget.

"I quickly withdrew, but not until I had seen a great light. I have loved, almost revered, Edwin M. Stanton ever since. His own heart was perhaps suffering more intense agony than the hearts of his petitioners, but he was compelled to steel his outward face for the bloody duties of war, while within his soul was warm with sympathy and sorrow."

One cannot help hoping that this deserter may have been one of those whose lives President Lincoln spared by overruling the decision of his secretary of war.

A more cheerful view of the great secretary is given by a fellow lawyer who knew him before the war.

"He was traveling by steamer on the Ohio to Pittsburg when he saw a man on the forward deck with a broken leg.

"Why is that sufferer not attended to?" he demanded of the captain, who replied that the man lived in Pittsburg, they nearly a hundred miles ahead, and would receive attention there.

"From a carpenter's chest Mr. Stanton promptly secured a saw and a hatchet with which to cut splints. Taking a sheet from a stateroom he set and bandaged the fractures. He then brought vinegar and water from the cook's room with which to steep the swollen parts and all the way to Pittsburg sat by the side of the injured man, applying the bath. When the boat reached Pittsburg he hired a carriage and took the man home."

Articles of Incorporation.
We, the undersigned do hereby associate ourselves together for the purpose of becoming incorporated under the laws of the State of Florida, to transact for profit the business hereinafter set forth; and we do adopt the following as the Charter of the proposed corporation:

I. The name of the corporation shall be AUSLEY & COMPANY, and its principal place of business shall be at Pensacola, Escambia County, Florida; but the Board of Directors may establish other places of business for said corporation within and without the State of Florida.

II. The general nature of the business to be transacted shall be that of brokers and dealers in cotton, grain, stock, bonds, etc., and merchandise generally; money brokers and commission merchants, and the doing of all business appertaining to a general commission brokerage business; the buying and selling of goods, wares and merchandise and chattels of every kind and character, either on commission or otherwise; also the acquiring, using, leasing and disposing of real and personal property for itself, or others on commission; the borrowing and lending of money on commission or otherwise; the doing of any business appertaining to a general loan and property agent; and the acquiring, using and disposing of property of all kinds necessary or incidental to said businesses.

III. The amount of the capital stock shall be ten thousand dollars, to be divided into one hundred shares of one hundred dollars each and to be paid in lawful money of the United States.

IV. The term for which the corporation is to exist shall be ninety-nine (99) years from the issuance of letters patent.

V. The business of the corporation shall be conducted by the following officers, viz: A President, a Secretary, a Treasurer and a Board of Directors, consisting of four stockholders; and by such subordinate officers as the Board of Directors may appoint. The office of Secretary and Treasurer may be filled by the same person. The directors shall be chosen by the stockholders and the other officers of the corporation shall be chosen by the Board of Directors. The above officers shall be elected on the first Tuesday of July in each year, which shall be the day for the annual meeting of the stockholders and directors. The officers who are to conduct the business of the corporation until those elected at the first election to be held on the day for the first annual meeting shall have qualified, shall be as follows:

J. J. Spooner, President; N. L. Spengler, Secretary and Treasurer; and J. J. Spooner, N. L. Spengler, F. S. King and T. A. Ausley, Directors.

VI. The highest amount of indebtedness or liability to which the corporation can at any time subject itself shall be Twenty Thousand Dollars.
