

CAPE SABLE IS A HUNTER'S PARADISE

Interesting Account of Several Days Spent There by a Miami Sportsman.

Harry M. Evans, a Miami sportsman, contributes the following interesting account of a trip to Cape Sable to the Miami Metropolis:

Many of the winter visitors to Miami are of the class who love field sports; who find sweet music in the splintered crack of the Winchester and the whizz of the reel, and perhaps it may not be generally known to them that Miami is in very easy reach of one of the very best hunting grounds in the United States today.

Being an enthusiastic lover of gun and rod myself and always looking for the best place to gratify my love for the sport and to collect and mount specimens of natural history, I decided to make a trip into adjacent fields and learn what I could of the game which I had been told abounded. My trip was a success, and as I secure information of value to the sportsmen who annually visit Miami, I will gladly share it with my kinsmen.

Bound for Cape Sable.

On November 8, Mr. E. A. McElroy and myself sailed for Cape Sable, which is about 130 miles below Miami, as we call it, and the most southerly point of the mainland. The route is very circuitous but one of interest and involves some of Florida's most exquisite scenic beauty. The trip as a cruise is one to enthrall the rover, while the channels are crisscrossed by a swarm with fish, both large and small which are easily taken. On our second day out thinking to diversify our sport, during a calm and a low tide we noticed many large reefish and shark feeding near a mud flat, and taking our two Winchester rifles and a skiff, drifted in among them; the sport began, and was sport really, and truly, until encouraged by our repeated ability to perforate the redfish a large shark nearly tempted us and letting the big fellow come within a dozen feet of the boat we let fly a bullet at the top of his broad head and another in his back near the big fin.

A Double Surprise.

The result was perhaps as great a surprise to ourselves as the shark; as if a blast of dynamite had exploded under him, the big fellow leaped into the air carrying barrels of water and the descent promised to swamp our frail craft. The shark apparently flamed, crazy and furious, turned upon his back, made a circuit of our boat, then—still on his back—narrowed straight at us, hitting us amidship and half filling the boat. This was evidently as much of a surprise to the shark again as to ourselves, for it once righted itself and made a frenzied dash for deeper water; reaching it his great tail fairly whipped the water into a boiling mass. Things were getting more serious this time than enjoyable, and we would have gladly backed off if we had had a fair wind, but his royal ribs wasn't through. Another rapid series of evolutions kept our craft bobbing around at a rate that drew on all our time and agility to keep in it, until at last, like a catapult he shot high up on the mud flat and stranded, very much to our relief. We had not lost any more sharks—our appetite for diversion was thoroughly satisfied and thinking we had a greater longing for a dish of fish chowder we left our victim floundering spasmodically in the mud and returned to the yacht fully determined not to "start" anything with a shark again.

People Hospitable.

In due time after a fine trip we put in to Flamingo Flats and dropped anchor in front of the home of Eugene Roberts, one of about a dozen families who constitute the population of the Cape. Every courtesy was extended us by these kindly people who possess that degree of kindness found only among frontiersmen. He knew where the game was and was ready with valuable information and advice. The next day after our arrival, while all were in Mr. Roberts's yard, Bob Doughty, a neighbor, came excitedly into our midst with the information that three bears were tearing up ant hills on the edge of the prairie, a short distance down the road. It did not take long to get our party in motion, Mr. Roberts with his faithful dog

in advance. The bears were there sure enough; and very soon a shower of Winchester balls were plowing through their black shaggy skins. A bear is not easily killed, and as the grass was as high as the bears, a running fight began which carried the party across the half mile of prairie and into the dense hammock. One bear was killed on the prairie and the second, supposed to be disabled, was passed, and pursuit was given to the largest one, which seemed very hard to down; hard pressed by the dog and sorely wounded, it treed where, with a single shot, it was brought down breaking off a very large limb as it fell. The bear would weigh at least 300 pounds. Mr. Roberts now returned for the mule and wagon and began gathering up the game, but the bear supposed to have been disabled, had recovered sufficiently to escape into the hammock and was not found until the next day, when, directed by buzzards, it was found, but they had spoiled the skin. However, we felt that two bears was not a bad bag. True to frontier custom, when the bears were dressed a portion was sent to each neighbor within reach. They were very fat and we decided that bear steak was not at all bad to take.

Myriads of Birds.

Having now a plenty of meat our party did not hunt for deer, which was very numerous there, and can be gotten in sufficient quantities to satisfy any reasonable sportsman. We shot only birds after this; duck and curlew are there, myriads of them. One of the party shot fifty-seven ducks in one day and could have killed five times as many had he wanted to. Among other hunters whom I met at the Cape was one of a school now almost extinct since frontier conditions which created them have faded into civilization. Uncle Steve Roberts is one of these fast vanishing characters, over 60 years of age, small stature, agile as a panther, big-hearted, kind and honest; and if all were as conscientious as he no criminal laws would be necessary. He has spent every year of his life in the wilds of Florida always keeping just ahead of advancing civilization, finding more music in the wail of the panther and the crack of his old rifle than in hand concerts and French operas.

"Uncle" Steve is by all odds the most expert hunter on the Cape and notwith standing his sixty plus years, he can scale the slimy logs of the glades with greater ability and wear out any other hunter, young or old, on the Cape. He enjoys a familiarity with the haunts and habits of every animal, bird or reptile of these swamps that is truly wonderful and unparelleled, and can only come of the closest and most intelligent observation.

Bagged a Catamount.

A very bold catamount had for some time prior to our visit to the Cape, been harassing the neighborhood and one night during our stay the varmint visited Mr. Doughty's home and killed two of his domestic cats on his door steps. As I only had a day or two left to spend at the Cape I asked "Uncle" Steve to get me "something
