PALAFIX STREET REPAIRS TO COMMENCE

Street Force Will To-day Begin Work of Repairing the Brent Road.

The city street force, which has been working in other portions of the city for some weeks, will to-day commence the important work of repairing and rebuilding the Brent road or the extension of Palafox street, which during the past several months has been in a most dilapidated condition, and which is growing worse with each day.

The material used for the rebuilding of this thoroughfare, which is the main one leaving from the city, will be clinders. This material will be secured from the Goulding Fertilizer factory, arrangements having been made by the city for the same.

It is expected that the rebuilding and repairing of the road will require a large force of men several weeks, as it will begin at the end of the city limits and continue south to about the corner of Wright street.

The work will be thorough in every respect, and it is anticipated that when it is completed the road will be one of the popular driveways of the city.

ELLEN CALL LONG HAS PASSED AWAY

DAUGHTER OF FORMER GOVERNOR AND FIRST WHITE CHILD BORN IN TALLAHASSEE

A Tallahassee dispatch to the Jacksonville Times-Union under date of December 17, says:

Mrs. Ellen Call Long died here today, in the eightieth year of her age, of paralysis.

She was a daughter of former Governor Richard Keith Call and was the first white child born in Tallahassee.

Mrs. Long was a woman of culture and had for long years been prominent in the social and intellectual life of the state. She was personally acquainted with every Governor of Florida from Jackson to Broward.

She was an authoress of distinction, Florida, Brezze being her best-known work, and leaves valuable manuscript of historical importance to Florida, which will undoubtedly be in demand.

A son, Richard C. Long, and a daughter, Mrs. E. K. Hollinger, mourn the death of their good mother.

The funeral will take place here Monday afternoon.

Mrs. Long spent years of her long and useful life in an effort to introduce silk culture as one of the profitable industries of Florida. She published a book on the subject, which is accepted authority to all who have ever engaged in the business in this state.

The team returned alone and a search was immediately instituted which revealed the body. The ground around showed signs of a protracted struggle. Neighbors, roused to frenzy, are hunting for the assailant.

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CUPID FOILED BY OFFICERS OF LAW

Young Couple of Warrington Desired to Become Man and Wife.

Officers of the United States succeeded in foiling Cupid yesterday and the day previous. That is they are of that opinion at the present time, and if they have not succeeded it is not their fault as they did everything possible to locate the young couple.

The would-be groom was Bennie White, aged 22 years, who is employed in the equipment department of the navy yard, while the young lady is Miss Lillian Howell, aged 15 years.

When the father of the young lady learned Monday that the couple had matrimonial intentions he proceeded to the office of United States Commissioner Marsh, where he made an affidavit against White, charging him with enticing away a girl under the age of fifteen for the purpose of a clandestine marriage. This was placed in the hands of a United States officer, but upon search neither of the parties could be found, and it was the supposition that they had gone to Mobile, inasmuch as when a license was refused them by Judge Bellinger on account of the age of the young lady, some mention was made of Alabama.

Yesterday morning, however, the young man appeared at the navy yard and resumed his duties. At the noon hour when an officer was expected to appear he left for home, supposedly to get dinner, but did not return. The young lady in the case also did not appear. In fact she could not be located.

Officers searched for the young man for some time, but upon the understanding that his father would produce him before the United States Commissioner this afternoon at 3 o'clock, they returned to the city.

MONEY BORROWED ON POLICIES SIMPLY DEFERS SURRENDER TO COMPANIES.

By Associated Press. New York, Dec. 19.—Before the insurance investigation committee, President H. B. Townsley, of the Life Association of America, was the first witness to-day, called to complete his testimony which was begun yesterday.

He was followed by President Talcott of the Washington Insurance Company, who gave details of his management. He differed from the previous witnesses to some extent, expressing the opinion that only about five per cent of insurance loans were ever paid up and that the loan was a deferred surrender of the policy. He viewed life insurance as such and not as an investment.
