## WILL CONSIDER THE LEASE OF CONVICTS

### Connty Commissioners Will Meet To-night to Hear Proposition of this Nature.

A special meeting of the Board of County Commissioners has been called for tonight for the purpose of hearing a proposition to lease all of the county prisoners. Other matters will also be acted upon by the board, especially relative to the mileage and amount to be drawn annually by the county commissioners, as it is understood a communication has been received from the attorney general giving his opinion upon the question. The question of abolishing the convict camp and leasing the convicts was called to the attention of the board by Mr. McLin, of the agricultural department of the state, who was recently here inspecting the local state camp. He spoke to some of the commissioners regarding the matter, stating that other counties were leasing their convicts. The board then decided to hear a proposition to see if the present plan could be improved upon. The working of the convicts upon the roads, however, has been very satisfactory, except that it is being done at considerable cost and some believe that labor could be employed and better results obtained than under the present plan.

Ausley & Co.'s Daily Cotton Letter. New York, Dec. 28.—Liverpool came 6 to 8 points lower on futures with spots reduced 14 points on sales of 10,000 bales, being an increase of from 4,000 to 5,000 over any previous day during the past month. This was regarded as an indication of activity on the part of the spinner and after opening from 5 to 8 points lower our markets rapidly advanced until prices were higher than last night's closing level. The increased sales of the actual stuff in the English market has been anxiously awaited by the talent for a long time and now that they have materialized the chances are all in favor of much higher prices for some days to come. Liverpool will have another holiday of 4 days beginning on Saturday next and we do not anticipate any great amount of aggressive buying until after this season is over. The spinner is bare of supplies and his shelves are bare of piece goods and his sales for the coming summer must be filled and he cannot remain out of the market any longer. The monetary situation of course has its bearing upon the situation and that it is in a very unsettled and unsatisfactory state goes without saying. Money was loaned on the New York Stock Exchange today as high as 110 per cent and unless something is done very quickly by the government or the financiers to relieve the situation panic will result and we do not think the great financiers of the country desire this and will use every means in their power to avert it and we think the clearing of the money situation will see an advance in the price of cotton that will make past records look like "30 cents."

Mr. Peters, the former vice-president of the Cotton Growers' Association, issued a circular from Dallas, Texas, this morning advising the farmer to sell now. The dispatch stated that Mr. Peters had lost his influence in Texas and no attention would be paid to him. The battle of the giants is on and what the outcome will be no one can tell, but we firmly believe the odds are all in favor of the market and advise purchases on all recessions. Short selling is a dangerous proposition under the present conditions for while it may seem very easy to sell something you do not have the day of reckoning must surely come.
