The Fastest Vessel in the World.

During the past year the British navy has been augmented by eight remarkable vessels known as fleet scouts, which have practically the speed of torpedo destroyers, but have sufficient length and coal capacity to go considerable distances and not only gain information, but prey upon an enemy's merchant shipping, says Harper's Weekly. The attentive, latest of these scouts, when recently tested made a record of 25.88 knots on a sustained run of six and a half hours, during which a maximum speed of 26 1/2 knots was reached, this being reached on the last hour of the trial trip. If destroyers and high speed launches are excepted this probably makes the Attentive the fastest vessel in the world and the representative of a type which soon may spread beyond the British navy.

FIGHTING THE LITTLEFIELD BILL

Executive Committee of Pilots Association Now in Session in Washington.

From the information which has so far reached Pensacola from Washington, the fight against the Littlefield pilotage bill is waxing warm, owing to the fact that the measure has passed the committee and has been recommended favorably by that body.

President O'Brien, who has fought this measure for years is on the ground and is doing everything possible to gain a victory for the pilots, and is being ably assisted by members of congress who are opposing the anti-pilotage measure.

"The executive committee of the National Bar Pilots' Association, comprising the ports from Boston to Norfolk, inclusive has been in session here for the past two days devising plans to defeat the Littlefield bill. The pilots are somewhat alarmed on account of the New York legislature passing resolutions endorsing the bill.

President O'Brien is very active in behalf of the interests of the pilots, as the exponents of the bill has a strong lobby here and a strong fight is being made."

FIVE PLANETARY ECLIPSES.

Astronomers Tell of Programme For the Coming Year.

Five eclipses will be recorded during the present year, three of the sun and two of the moon, according to the naval observatory astronomer, says the Washington Post. The first will be a total eclipse of the moon, visible throughout North America.


The eclipse will begin at 10:54 o'clock on the evening of Feb. 8, and by 4:40 o'clock the next morning it will have passed away. A partial eclipse of the sun, visible only near the south pole, will be the feature of Feb. 22.

Another partial eclipse of the sun will take place July 21, which will not be seen in the United States. On Aug. 4 will occur the second total eclipse of the moon, which will be visible in the western portion of the United States just before sunrise. The moon will again be partly eclipsed on the 19th of the same month, but the phenomenon will be witnessed only by inhabitants of the northern regions.

Why Carnegie Wants an Orchestra.

Andrew Carnegie, who was recently said to have music played to him in the morning to awaken him, now intends to have a private orchestra of his own, says the New York Tribune. This plan he has been cherishing for some time, but he now is reported to have taken steps to carry it out. When he was made a doctor of music by the Grand Conservatory of Music of this city some time ago he wrote to its president of his desire to have an orchestra. "Music," he said, "becomes to me more and more necessary every year of my life. We have a fine musician at Sidbo during our stay. He plays the organ for us in the morning and gives piano recitals at night. I hope to have something of a small orchestra by and by. The king of Bavaria had one, and most people thought him a fool in consequence. I see almost every day of my life much greater fools than he who spend money in ways much less commendable."
