# FISH ABUNDANT IN THE SOUTH

COMMISSIONER OF FISHERIES BOWERS TELLS OF THE MARKET IN FLORIDA.

The Jacksonville Metropolis says: Commissioner George W. Bowers, of the Bureau of Fisheries, returned to Washington on Saturday last from Florida and Cuba, where he studied the culture of sponges and the marketing of fish in that community.

"I have always held," said Mr. Bowers, "that the old woman who raised chickens and the Bureau of Fisheries were the greatest benefactors of mankind. As long as chickens and fish are to be had all the beef trusts in the world cannot run the meat market unreasonably, because the masses of people will then eat chickens and fish."

Mr. Bowers stated that the fish markets of Havana were a model of efficiency and thoroughness. This condition is probably due to the large number of Catholics who are heavy consumers of fish.

In Florida Mr. Bowers found that fish were generally eaten and were remarkably cheap. The negro fishermen, bringing in shad and other fish from the St. Johns river and other streams, where they are plentiful, sell them to the dealers at a low price. This assures the poor people an abundance of cheap fish.

**\$100,000 Worth of Sponges.** Tarpon Springs, Fla., Mr. Bowers said, has become the greatest producer of sponges of any town in the United States. In the past two months \$100,000 worth of sponges have been marketed from this point.

This large production is due, it is said, to the introduction of great numbers of Greek divers from the Mediterranean. These men are adepts at procuring sponges and are able to go to greater depths than the natives.

At Coconut Grove and other points in Florida the government is carrying forward extensive experiments in sponge farming and transplanting. The yield for the last few years has declined, and because of an absence in the market of a desirable size, the price has advanced. The catch in the "key grounds" has been very small for several years, which the spongers attribute to the prevalence of cloudy water, but there is little doubt that it is due in a large measure to the exhaustion of the grounds.

It is said there are places where the water rarely clears where a large catch could be made under favorable conditions, but the turbidity of the water in these sections is no new thing, and should not be cited as a cause of the continued small catch in the key region. In other sections the shoal waters have been somewhat exhausted.

The bureau is attempting, by transplanting and sponge farming, to overcome the tendency to exhaust the supply in the gulf waters, and it is held that new farms may be started and the culture carried on as has been the case with oysters.
