## SAGE LEAVES

I was once a voluntary "drummer" for contributions from the Ohio farmers for that Christ-like home, shipping many barrels of clothing and eatables directly to the managers of the institution.

Let us not despair. It is only by approximate steps of these upbuilding lessons that we can reach the top of civilization where charity broadens into universal love.

The harvest graduating lesson in Christianity consists in learning to die for our enemies.
