**DEMAND FOR RED SNAPPERS IS HEAVY**

**Packing House Scandal in Chicago Causes Demand for Gulf Fish.**

"Never before in the history of the red snapper business has there been such a demand for the fish," said Capt. T. E. Welles, manager of the firm of E. E. Saunders & Co. yesterday, when discussing the fish business.

"To what do I attribute this demand?" asked the captain, "well, the people have probably found out that fish caught in water thirty to fifty fathoms deep cannot bear any of the impurities that the meats do that are being offered for sale. We have been unable to fill all our orders for several weeks, but just now the demand is exceptionally heavy, and it is probable that the beef scandal report has something to do with it."

Speaking of the fishing grounds, Captain Welles said that his vessels were not fishing any further west than the mouth of the Mississippi. Most of the vessels are fishing along the Florida coast, between Pensacola and Tortugas, where the red snapper is generally found in large numbers during the summer months. What will be done during the winter months, however, is a question that is causing the local fish dealers some uneasiness. During the winter the vessels go to the Campechee banks after their fish, and just now the Mexican government seems to be exercising a supervision over all that territory, but it is thought this will cease before the winter sets in.

Captain Welles said yesterday that there were no fishing grounds within three miles of the shore, which is the boundary limit, but that the vessels recently seized were ten or twelve miles at sea when the seizure was made by a Mexican gunboat. The Mexican officers, however, would swear the smacks had been within the boundary line. That would settle the case in Mexico, as the oath of the captain and crew of the fishing vessel would be of little weight. Unless there are steps taken by the state department before the winter season, there is liable to be a scarcity of red snappers, not only at Pensacola, but at all gulf ports.

**RACE BOAT WILL BE LAUNCHED SOON**

**Fast Launch Owned by Allie Reira Is Now Nearing Completion.**

What is expected to become one of the fastest naphtha launches in the south is now nearing completion on Baylen street wharf. The owner is Allie Reira, while the person who has done most of the work, and to whom the credit for carrying out the plans of the designer is due is John Johnson.

The name of the vessel has not yet been selected. She has beautiful lines, is about 41 feet over all with 5 foot beam, and will be propelled by a 28 horse power Speedway gasoline engine, which is expected to drive her through the water at the rate of at least twenty miles an hour.

A vessel of the new boat's model has never been seen in Pensacola, or probably in the south. Everything has been sacrificed for speed. She is long and sharp and has the appearance of a greyhound, so to speak.

The engine arrived here last week from New York and is now on the wharf ready to be installed. The engine is a powerful one and one of the finest ever installed in a launch here. The boat will probably be launched during the latter portion of the week, and the engines will be installed at once. It is expected that she will have her trial trip within the course of the next ten or fifteen days.

The new boat, if she comes up to expectations in the way of speed, will be used as a race boat, and will challenge a number of the fast yachts in southern waters for races. The owner had this idea in view for two years, or since the races here during the time that the North Atlantic fleet was in port, but decided that in order to get a boat to come up to the requirements she would have to be built to order. She has been under construction for several months and nothing but the very best material has been used.

**Green Food For Chickens.**  
It is advisable to let the chicks have access to green feed at all times. Fing clover hay cut with an ordinary cutter is excellent and also makes a good litter to scatter the feed in. It is best, however, to give the last food at night on a clean board, letting the chicks eat all they will and then removing the board. At other times care should be taken that they be kept hungry or at least sufficiently so to be eager to eat when fresh food is offered them.

**OBJECTS TO THE PLANS FOR SEWERAGE**

**Interested Citizen Believes Outlet Should Be Below City Instead of Above It.**

The following communication, which is self-explanatory, has been received from a gentleman who, at least for the present, requests that his name be withheld:

Editor Pensacola Journal:  
The city is about to award contracts for installing a sewerage system. All agree this is a good thing and should be installed as soon as possible. But I have been told the plans provide for emptying the sewerage at one place and that above the city near Muscogee wharf.

This seems to me to be a very serious mistake. After the sewerage is emptied into the bay it will naturally work itself toward sea. If all sewerage is dumped above the city it must all pass the city to find its way to the sea and as a consequence more or less of it will find lodgment among the wharves and along the water front. Then when the tide comes in some of the sewerage will be carried back past the city and with the outgoing tide will pass the city the third time.

Now, it seems to me that if the sewerage was emptied into the bay below the city most of it would go to sea without passing the wharves at all, while only a small portion of it would be carried up and back with the tides. This would prevent much of the filth from finding lodgment among the wharves and along the water front.

It takes just as much pipe and just as much expense to dispose of the sewerage above the city as it does below the city. Therefore the plan seems to be very faulty and objectionable. To my mind it appears to be the height of folly and lack of good judgment to empty the filth of the city above the town instead of below it.

I, for one, would be glad to see the plans changed in this particular.

**Growing Ducklings.**  
With a view to securing data relative to the cost of raising ducks, five newly hatched Pekin ducks at the Utah station were fed for nine weeks a mixture of ground grains and skim milk in the form of a mash, with cut bones and a little green alfalfa. The grain consisted of bran, shorts, wheat, corn, rolled oats and linseed meal in varying proportions. At the close of the period the ducks had made a total gain of 27.3 pounds. Each pound of gain required 3.2 pounds grain, a like amount of skim milk and 0.16 pound meat scrap, the cost being 3.33 cents.

**The Care of Lambs.**  
As soon as the lamb is born place it with its mother in a small individual lambing pen. The pen need not be more than five feet square and may be constructed of fence panels. After three or four days the shepherd can make sure that the lamb is "owned" and has learned to nurse. Then the ewes and lambs may be turned into a larger compartment, from which the lambs can escape at will through a lamb creep. Shropshire lambs or similar breeds will eat grain by the time they are one month old.—Farming.

**FORMER CITIZEN OF PENSACOLA DROWNED**

**Timothy B. Clement Lost His Life as Result of an Explosion on Launch at Mobile.**

The Mobile Register of Sunday says: While trying the speed of a beautiful launch built by home talent yesterday evening, an explosion occurred which resulted in the drowning of Mr. Timothy A. Clement, agent for the Wolverine Motor Works in Mobile.

The boat had just been christened for the daughter of her builder as "Alice K." and against the expressed wishes of the owner, she was making a first trip up the river with a party of a score or more aboard. It was growing dark when a party aft on the boat called from her consort, the Maurela, for a lantern. The request when complied with, it appears that when the lantern was nearing the engine, which was amidship, an explosion caused general consternation among the passengers, but nearby boats were quick to the rescue. However, some members of the crew went overboard, among them being Mr. Clement.

All were picked up except him, the parties on the assisting boats being unable to reach him. He sank walls.


