# NEWS GATHERED ABOUT THE WHARVES

## Cayo Manzanillo and Burnby Entered for Lumber and Timber Cargoes.

The big turret steamer Burnby, Captain Thomas, entered late yesterday afternoon from Las Palmas, consigned to the William S. Keyser Co. The vessel will at once prepare to take on a cargo of lumber and timber by that firm.

The British steamer Cayo Manzanillo, consigned to the Gulf Transit Company, arrived in port yesterday. The steamer will load here a part cargo of lumber and timber, and proceed to Bermuda where she will complete loading for England.

The steamer Monviso is due here Friday from New Orleans. She will load a cargo of 2,000 tons of phosphate rock, and lumber and timber for Spezia.

The steamer August Belmont is expected to reach port about the 27th. She has on board a cargo of kaimit from Rotterdam, and as soon as this is discharged will load cotton, phosphate and lumber for Antwerp.

The steamer E. O. Saltmarsh, which is now on the Serra line, is due in a few days from Cuban ports, where she carried cargo. She is plying between here and Liverpool and will load out a general cargo for the latter port.

The dealer took a live lobster out of a heap on the marble slab. "Its name is Joe," the dealer said after he had inspected one of its legs. "Now, can you find it?"


