The Sunday school room of the First Presbyterian church has been secured and the ladies do their work there. Four sewing machines are now running and more can be kept busy if the ladies volunteer in sufficient numbers. Every lady who can do any of this work is requested to call there and take her scissors with her and anyone who can donate raw material in the way of dry goods which can be made into clothing or bedding, is requested to send it there. The work which these ladies are doing is a splendid one and will result in great relief to those who lost all in the storm.

More sewing machines are needed and those who are in a position to loan machines to the sewing circle are requested to do so. Ladies who desire to assist in the work may do so either by coming in person, sending a sewing girl or donating raw material.

WATER COMPANY REPLIES TO MAYOR

Denies That It Is Liable for Penalty and Says Pressure is Sufficient.

The Pensacola Water Company has replied to the letter of Mayor Bliss, in which he stated to the company that it was being penalized at the rate of \$5 per hour for every hour or fraction thereof that the water in the stand pipe is below a certain stage, and inasmuch as the stand pipe is claimed to be empty, it means twenty-four hours per day.

President Pitt's Reply. The letter of President Pitt, received by Mayor Bliss yesterday afternoon, is as follows:

"Pensacola, Fla., Oct. 12, 1906. Hon. C. H. Bliss, Mayor, Pensacola, Florida.

"Dear Sir—We are in receipt of your letter of the 11th inst., calling our attention to the fact that we are violating our franchise as granted by the city as shown in section 15, by not having maintained a sufficient number of feet of water in the stand pipe on North Hill, Palafox street.

"We claim that we are not liable for the demurrage of five dollars an hour demanded by the city for not having used the standpipe for the past few days as we have provided for just such cases by placing a tower tank on East Hill and can show that, with the exception of a few hours on the day after the storm, we have maintained a pressure required by the franchise.

"We have endeavored to have the standpipe repaired, and have only in the last two days found competent mechanics to do the work.

Violating Franchise.

Mayor Bliss stated last night that the Water Company is still violating the provisions of its franchise and that he is imposing the penalty of \$5 per hour, as he gave the company notice that he would. He says the company's franchise provides that there shall at all times be maintained a certain amount of water in the stand pipe or the water there must not be allowed to go below a certain stage.

This he claims has been violated and furthermore that the required pressure is not being given. Thursday during a fire, he said, when the company should have given a pressure of 150 pounds, it furnished only 45 pounds.

ESCAPED CONVICT CAPTURED IN GULFPORT

Sheriff Van Pelt received notification yesterday from the authorities at Gulfport to the effect that Henry Webb, colored, an escaped convict from the county chain gang here, had been captured there and that by paying the officers a reward and a fine of \$25 which had been imposed upon the negro, the local sheriff could take charge of him. As no reward has been offered it is not likely that the Gulfport officers will see the color of the \$50 of which they now have visions.

Webb shot a negro named Henry Williams about two years since and was given a twelve months sentence, part of which he had served when he made his escape.

vanced that the action of our ordinary violent storms will assist rather than retard.

7.—That I recommend for the present nothing be done more than observe carefully the result of the natural forces.

8.—That from a comparison of early reports with the examination made on the 5th, that the work of rebuilding has materially advanced.

I beg to report further that I will keep this matter under careful examination and report to you from time to time and the results as I find them. During abnormal storms, naturally, the lowest places suffer most; particularly is this true when they become submerged by the rise of tide alone, for then the wave action continues across them and rapid erosion follows. This evidently was the case in the locations under consideration, and probably will be the case after they have been rebuilt by tides and waves. To avoid then a re-occurrence of this I believe, after the rebuilding has advanced to a few feet above mean low water, that it would be advisable to assist natural forces by a series of brush fences, so placed as to catch the sands which are being shifted by winds. The results that may be attained by such structures can be seen all along this island where vegetation and shrubbery has taken root.

Trusting I have made myself clear and hoping I convey the assurance I personally feel in the safety of our commercial interests.

Efforts Appreciated. Senator Mallory's activity in this matter has been highly appreciated and the whole community feels grateful to him for his efforts to protect Pensacola's interests.

DAMAGE LIGHT AT ST. ANDREW

The last issue of the St. Andrews Buoy says: Extravagant and outrageously untruthful reports concerning the damage sustained by St. Andrew in the late storm are being industriously circulated in some parts of the city. What the parties think to gain by circulating these reports of wholesale

destruction, it is hard to imagine to anyone visiting the place. True, the sidewalks were washed away and a good many wharves were washed away or damaged to a greater or less extent, but not sufficiently but what there have been safe landings for all vessels at all times since the cessation of the storm. Two or three small boats were driven ashore, but none of them were badly damaged. Only one building was damaged in the least as far as the Buoy can learn, and that was John R. Thompson's small new freight house, built upon his wharf. The plings were washed from under it and it tilted over close by and is now being righted up, practically intact and will be placed in its original position.
