WILL RUN 2 YEARS HENCE

Mr. Bingham Gives Notice He Will Again Run For Board of Works.

"Of course I am disappointed, but on the whole the impressions that remain with me of my three weeks, day-and-night run, are pleasant," said F. F. Bingham yesterday. "I have held all my friends and made some new ones."

"When I started on this accidental run, the first thing I did was to check off the poll lists the names of those I could count on for votes 'on personal grounds,' over and above all other reasons. The list totalled up 418 voters. The incompletes returned now to indicate that I got about 460 votes, so I figure I landed my 418 personal friends according to schedule, and that, in addition, 42 other voters were fooled into voting for me on account of my name being at the head of the ticket."

"It is all right. The only kick I have to make will be made (that is, imparted) in private."

"In making my canvass, I ran across all kinds of reasons why I could not be supported. One of these was that I did not come out soon enough, and I think there was something to this. When I find I am wrong, I am willing to admit it and therefore, in order to meet this objection, I now give notice that 'at the earnest' solicitation of many friends, I will be a candidate for membership on the Board of Public Works two years hence. Do you think that is sufficient notice? If not, say so now, for after I get started nothing can stop me from running."

"If I should die during the next two years, my many friends can withdraw me if they think best."

"I do not wish this program to interfere with my successful opponents going ahead and making the water-front improvement. I can find plenty of issues."

"No, I do not think I will use the booklet method next time. The booklet was altogether too successful. It completely overshadowed its author. Certainly, I will not try any sleight-of-hand tricks, or any monkey-business, such as calling myself a Democrat when, as a matter of fact, I am a Republican."

Attracted Much Attention. The interest that Pensacolians took in Mr. Bingham's little booklet was shared by a great many people at a distance, and Mr. Bingham received letters from several different states with comments. Governor Broward wrote Mr. Bingham as follows, viz: "Dear Sir:—In reply to your esteemed favor of May 26th, in which you enclose one of your beautiful little pamphlets, will say that as a campaign document, your little booklet is one of the most unique that I have ever seen in print, and interesting from cover to cover. I shall watch your candidacy with a great deal of interest, especially as I notice that you are a republican in politics. I would be glad to be informed by a message the result of your very remarkable campaign. I have never before seen a platform exactly like yours. I am interested in the view that will be taken of it by the people."

"With kind regards, Yours very truly, 'N. B. BROWARD,' Governor."

Mr. Bingham's telegram to the governor was as follows, viz: "Got beat. The white Democratic primary is something terrible."

Women Street Cleaners are Cleansors of Munich Street

Women sweep the streets in Munich. They do it well. They are conscientious workers, cheerful and alert, and they seem to enjoy it. A young American woman who was the sight of women busy in the streets all day, broom in hand from sunrise to sunset. "The idea of women doing men's rough work!" was her sympathetic wail. Now, as a matter of fact, the idea was a very pleasant one. I have never seen more wholesome, robust, contented working women than the street sweepers of Munich. Cheeks are as red as August roses in the Hofgarten; skin a rich lustrous brown, hands capable, muscle flexible, a clear eye and clean smile—how often can one schedule such a list of physical perfections in a New England kitchen. And such nice, stout pleasant-colored homespun clothes. Such blues as you see in the Bavarian fields harvest days (there women also help), such reds as belong to warm Bavarian landscapes, the same rich vegetable hue that is in the red-tiled houses and capped stone fences, the red of the earth. A soft blue petticoat, a red sash, a white kerchief and a jaunty green Tyrolean hat with a gay little feather, bespeaking an interest in decoration and adornment, is indeed a costume for White Wings to envy. There is a pleasant "guten tag" with a fine cordiality of intonation to every passer-by. A glad "danke schien" for unexpected penning, good cheer for every swing of the broom, and a housewifely pride in the well-garnished strasse. And when you stop to think of it, why should women be debarred from wholesome outdoor occupations? What false standards of social conditions have been accepted that it has become a degradation for women to work out of doors, to be in the fields, in gardens, in town streets? Not that harvesting and street sweeping are always desirable or good for all women, but if anyone prefers the open sunlight to shadow, fresh air to cooking smells, why must anyone else shudder to see such a one rosy and cheerful and enjoying life? And why must there be an arbitrary dividing line of social sentiment that makes it good form for men to earn a living out of doors and grow stalwart and cheerful by so doing, and degrading for women to do it?—The Craftsman.
