

## LED A FIGHT IN GEORGIA

Rev. J. R. Culpepper Was a Big Factor in Recent Liquor Campaign.

ONE OF THE LEADERS IN THE LOWNDES COUNTY PROHIBITION FIGHT, RECENTLY ENDED, BUT IS COMING HERE FOR OTHER BRANCHES OF CHURCH WORK.

The fact that Rev. J. R. Culpepper, was a leader in the prohibition campaign at Valdosta, Ga., last spring, working there from February to June, when the fight resulted in Lowndes county going dry by a large majority, caused much speculation here as to whether he and his son would during their revival work here try to work up prohibition sentiment in Pensacola.

Rev. Mr. Rogers, pastor of the Gadsden Street Methodist church, and in whose church the Rev. Culpepper will hold revival services, said yesterday it is not their intention to organize a campaign just at this time, although Mr. Rogers said he could not say what would be done along these lines by Rev. Culpepper in the future. Dr. Culpepper is coming here on church work, pure and simple, and will merely hold revival services in the Gadsden Street Methodist church. There will be two services daily after Friday at 10 a. m. and at 8 p. m.

Gentry, the actor who was convicted of the murder of Madge Yorke, an actress, in Philadelphia, in 1898. Last spring efforts to free him from a life sentence after nearly eleven years in prison were begun, and his case has been under advisement since May.
