# REMAINS ARE LAID AT REST

Funeral of the Late A. N. Knowles Occurred Sunday in Presence of Hundreds.

One of the largest funerals which has ever been witnessed in the city of Pensacola took place Sunday afternoon, when, at 4:30 o'clock, all that was mortal of the late A. N. Knowles, who received his death wound during the trouble of last Wednesday night, lay mute in the last earthly homage of a city of sorrowing people. The events of the week, so horribly begun, the effects and aftermath of which had plunged a community into a gloom which will be difficult to dispel, appeared to have been fittingly climaxed by the death of this man, who had met the death of a martyr to a cause which held sacred as who was to be consigned to his lasting sleep, wept and sung even by hundreds who had not known him in life excepting for the brief period in which he had filled the centre of the stage during the last few days of his earthly allotment.

It was not a crowd of the morbidly curious which filled the tiny home and the streets surrounding Sunday, but rather an assemblage of the best of local citizenry, and the long files of those who had come to take a final leave taking of "Bud" Knowles as he lay still in death, was a mark of the esteem in which he had been held and of the feeling of intense sympathy which had been aroused by his untimely death.
