## THE TORPEDO FLOTILLA IS IN PENSACOLA BAY

Five Boats Reach Here For Three Months' Winter Target Practice.

The torpedo boat flotilla arrived at the Pensacola navy yard Sunday from Mayport, near Jacksonville and will remain here for about two weeks before going to St. Joseph's bay for torpedo practice.

The flotilla consists of the following boats: McDonough, Lieut. Mitchell; Wilkie, Ensign Peggam; Tinsley, Lieut. Richardson; DeLong, Lieut. Sadler; Thornton, Lieut. Blakesley. A portion of the practice will be held in Pensacola bay, near the navy yard, and it is expected that the boats will spend two or three months' time between Pensacola and St. Joseph's bay.

Some of the officers' wives are expected to arrive here during the week, arrangements for their accommodation having already been made.

## RECORDER HAD LARGE DOCKET

Monday Morning Mill Had a Big Grist to Grind.

The Monday morning recorder's docket was a large one and some time was consumed in disposing of all the cases. Seventy cases were docketed for trial, Recorder Johnson presiding. Sixty-two defendants were found guilty, one was discharged and seven cases were continued. Fines to the amount of \$348 were assessed. One defendant, charged with being a dangerous and suspicious character, was turned over to the county authorities.

Henry Vickers, colored, charged with assault, disorderly conduct, assault with a pistol and discharging firearms in the city limits, was fined \$15 and costs.

Napoleon Thomas, charged with reckless driving, was fined \$4 and costs.

M. Constantine, M. Dimity and Geo. Vasso, Greek merchants, charged with keeping open doors on Sunday, were each fined \$10 and costs in the recorder's court yesterday.

Dan Smiley, who pleaded guilty to the charge of keeping a gaming place and also to engaging in a game of chance, \$5 and costs; one defendant for engaging in a game of chance, \$5 and costs. The cases against Wm. Pruitt, charged with engaging in a game of chance, was continued until this morning.

Wm. Cator, a well known young white man of this city, was arrested by the city authorities Sunday night on the charge of being a dangerous and suspicious character. His case was called in the recorder's court yesterday morning, but was continued until this morning. He was released on bond.

## 2ND SHIPMENT OF SULPHUR

Imports Are Being Made Through Pensacola For Interior Points.

The second cargo of sulphur ore to arrive at this port within a week was brought here yesterday on the British steamship Port Inglis. She has a cargo of 2,816 tons of sulphur ore and has been docked at railroad wharf, where it will be unloaded.

The other cargo was brought here by the steamship Axminster and the work of unloading these cargoes will furnish employment to a large number of men during the present week. The work of discharging both cargoes will commence today.
