HARBOR, RIVER AND MARINE NEWS

Shipping Transactions and Notes of Interest Along The Bay Front.

The steamer Tarpon, Capt. Barrow, will arrive this morning from St. Andrews and other points. She will leave Sunday night at 8:30 for Mobile.

The Norwegian bark Superb was moved yesterday from Palafox to Muscooge wharf.

The smack Lettie G. Howard arrived yesterday to E. E. Saunders & Co. with 17,000 pounds of red snappers and 4,000 pounds of groupers.

The smack Algoma arrived yesterday to the Warren Fish Company with 19,000 pounds of red snappers and 1,500 pounds of groupers.

The smack Sheffeyld, which has received a thorough overhauling at the marine ways, was towed over to the city yesterday afternoon.

Around the Horn.

The clipper ships have gone out, but perhaps there may be a revival of something just as good or a little better to take their places and travel over the courses made famous by the speed records of the old types. The announcement of a San Francisco firm that it has arranged with a Bath shipbuilding company to build and put in service a fleet of four iron four-masted sailing vessels between New York and the Golden Gate will be of interest to those who remember with enthusiasm the craft that had to fight their way with wind and wave by the skill of the seaman rather than by that of the engineer. It is estimated that it will take 120 days for each trip and that the fleet can make six round trips annually. Of course, the larger tonnage will make up for the difference in speed between these and the old clippers, the former grayhounds of commerce. These vessels were renowned for quick runs and not infrequently made faster records than the steamers. The first one built in this country was at Baltimore, and bore the name of that city. They were longer and of less beam than the ordinary vessel and were largely employed in the China trade and in early communication between New York and California, the service for which the proposed new vessels are destined.—Boston Transcript.

GOLDEN NUGGETS FOR SALLOW PEOPLE

Rheumatism PRESENTED WITH A CANE

HON. JOHN E. STILLMAN SENT HANDSOME GOLD-HEADED CANE TO HON. JAMES E. ALEXANDER.

The Jacksonville Times-Union of recent date contained the following: "Hon. James E. Alexander, representative to the legislature from Volusia county, was exhibiting a handsome gold-headed cane he had just received by express from Pensacola, Thursday. In 1884, the Arlington hotel at Gainesville, which was located at the northwest corner of the public square, was burned and the courthouse, which at that time was a wooden structure, caught on fire. The clerk of the court was J. H. Carlisle, who offered \$100 to the first person on the roof in order to save the building. Hon. J. E. Stillman, collector of customs at the Port of Pensacola, was a cadet at the East Florida Seminary at the time and was the first one on the courthouse roof and saved the building by removing the burning saingles with his bare hands. There were over 100 people claiming the reward of \$100 the next day, but Mr. Alexander was there and told Clerk Carlisle that Cadet Stillman, a brave and handsome boy from Volusia, was the first to appear on the courthouse roof and that he was entitled to the \$100 reward. Upon Mr. Alexander's statement, Clerk Carlisle paid the \$100 to Stillman, which had not been forgotten by Mr. Stillman—for after Mr. Alexander's defeat for the speakership he received a handsome gold-headed cane with the following inscription thereon: "J. E. Alexander, from J. E. Stillman, 1884." In a letter to Mr. Alexander, Mr. Stillman reminded him of his kindness in 1884 and told him although defeated for speaker he was still near and dear to the hearts of the people of Florida."

THE GRAND JURY DID NOT FINISH ITS BUSINESS

REPORTED TO THE COURT YESTERDAY THAT PRESENTMENT COULD NOT BE MADE BEFORE TODAY—NO CASES HEARD DURING YESTERDAY.

The grand jury of the circuit court did not conclude its labors yesterday, as was expected, but it is expected that today a final presentment will be made by the members, who have been in session for a week. The report of the jury is looked forward to with interest.

Yesterday Judge Wolfe, just before adjourning court in the forenoon, sent word to the jury and asked if it would be ready to report during the day. The reply was that the report could not be made possibly before Saturday.

There were no cases docketed for trial and as soon as the court learned there would be no report from the grand jury adjournment was taken until this morning.

WILL DISCUSS AMENDMENT TO CONSTITUTION

CHAMBER OF COMMERCE WILL HOLD A SPECIAL MEETING TO DAY AND DISCUSS THE PROPOSED PROHIBITION AMENDMENT.

A number of leading business men met yesterday afternoon to talk over the situation as regards the proposed constitutional amendment relative to state prohibition. They represented both the wet and the dry sentiment.

It was decided to request the president of the Chamber of Commerce to call a special meeting for noon to-day to discuss the matter, the body being representative of all business interests, and it being felt that probably the Chamber of Commerce, better than any other body, could discuss the matter from non-political viewpoints and arrive at the most satisfactory decision as to what steps to take.

Five of the gentlemen present who were also members of the Chamber of Commerce therefore made request on President Thornton to call a special meeting, which he did last night. Speaking of the call for a meeting, the secretary last night said: "The meeting is called to discuss the proposed constitutional amendment from as nearly a non-political viewpoint as a piece of legislation can be. It is hoped that every member of the Chamber of Commerce will be present, whichever way his vote would go in the event of the amendment going to a popular vote. The Chamber's duty in such matters is not to discuss wet or dry but the question of a constitutional amendment."
