## JOHN APOSTLE EXONERATED OF MURDER CHARGE

### MAN ARRESTED ON CHARGE OF CAUSING DEATH OF K. JACOBSEN, A NORWEGIAN SAILOR, IS RELEASED.

The preliminary hearing of John Apostle, a Greek, who was charged with the murder of K. Jacobsen, a Norwegian sailor, resulted in the defendant being acquitted by Justice Nickelsen yesterday morning.  
J. W. Kehoe, who represented the state, informed Justice Nickelsen that the state had failed to make a case against Apostle, this announcement being made previous to the decision rendered by the judge.  
Jacobsen came here several weeks ago on the Norwegian schooner Mexico.

Claiming that because she delayed in finding her shoes when ordered by her husband to perform some household duty, Mrs. Irvin, wife of John Irvin, residing at the head of Bayou Chico, said she had been severely whipped by her infuriated husband and asked that he be arrested. Sheriff Van Pelt and Deputy Johnson arrested Irvin and locked him up in the county jail Thursday night, remaining there in default of \$500 bond.  
It is charged that Irvin inflicted punishment on his wife by using a whip and that several marks on her body show where she was struck.  
Mrs. Irvin, who is so afflicted with defective speech as to render her almost dumb, is a niece of Special Officer Wm. Ray, of this city.

## MANY HERE TO SUBMIT BIDS ON STREET PAVING

### REPRESENTATIVES OF PAVING CONCERNS ARRIVE TO MAKE INVESTIGATIONS BEFORE BIDDING — PROPOSALS WILL BE OPENED TUESDAY AT NOON.

Representatives of a number of street paving and construction companies are in the city looking into the matter of paving with a view of submitting bids for paving streets as recently authorized by the city council. The total to be expended at this time for paving is between \$300,000 and \$400,000.

The proposals are to be opened by the Board of Bond Trustees Tuesday at noon, and it is expected there will be a large number of bidders.

Among the representatives of paving firms now in the city are: W. B. C. Picher, of Nashville; E. P. McLain, of the Graves-Matthews Paving Co., of Birmingham; A. C. Callocott, of the Southern Paving Co., of Montgomery. Another prominent arrival yesterday was H. A. Newpher, of the bond department of the First National Bank, of Cleveland. He is here with a view of purchasing the paving bonds, which are to be taken by the contractors as part payment for the work.

## BIG SHIPMENT IRISH POTATOES TO CINCINNATI

### SEVEN HUNDRED BARRELS OF THE NEW CROP PASS THROUGH FROM THE PERDIDO COUNTRY TO MARKET.

Seven hundred barrels of new Irish potatoes, grown on the Willock farm at Spring Bluff, near Perdido bay, were brought here and shipped to Cincinnati during the past several days, the raising of the potatoes being done under the supervision of A. Suarez.  
The farm on which the potatoes were grown is owned by Harry J. Willock, of Pittsburg, Pa., president of the Waverly Oil Company.  
The first shipment, consisting of 343 barrels, was brought here Thursday, May 20, being immediately loaded on cars at Jefferson street wharf and shipped to a commission house in Cincinnati.  
The second shipment consisted of 357 barrels, being received here last Tuesday. This shipment also went to Cincinnati.  
Mr. Suarez stated that there are at present 1100 fine pecan trees growing on the Willock farm at Spring Bluff. New Irish potatoes find a ready market in the north at this time of the year, as the crop raised in that section is not placed on the market until July.
