WRECKAGE OF A BR. SCHOONER

PASSED AND REPORTED ON BY
PENSACOLA FISHING SMACK,
WHICH BROUGHT EVIDENCES
OF DISCOVERY TO THIS PORT.

Upon arrival of the fishing smack Amy Wixon to Warren & Co., yesterday, the captain reported having passed the water-logged British schooner Mariana in the gulf, a great danger to navigation. The crew, which arrived some time ago at Gulfport, left the schooner in a great hurry. When the vessel was abandoned she was shrouded with fog, making water, losing deckload and in danger of going to pieces. This is the way the Amy Wixon reported:

"On September 14, in latitude 25:30 and longitude 86:30, passed British schooner Maratana, water-logged and abandoned, crew evidently leaving in a hurry. Found papers aboard bearing date June 4, 1909. Mobile, bills of lading, and other things. Was lumber-laden; deckload was gone and decks breaking up."

Captain A. F. Warren, to whom the report was rendered, took the trouble to send papers to Mobile, where they will in all probability be of some value.

The Amy Wixon pronounced the derelict a serious menace to navigation. No spars are standing and the hull is low in the water, what remains of the deck being awash with very little sea. The hull is full of lumber. The abandoned vessel's wheel and two small anchors were taken off by men from the Pensacola vessel.

SCHOOL HOUSE PLANS IN HAND

PREPARED BY EXPERT IN THAT LINE AND ARE GIVEN MUCH PRAISE BY BUILDING INSPECTOR, WHO HAS APPROVED THE FINE SET.

Plans for the new school building in New City, which were filed last Thursday with the building inspector, have not only been approved by that official, but are pronounced by Inspector Johnson as the most complete, most excellent and a set which are more set out in detail than any he has ever seen. He has taken time to examine them thoroughly before giving his approval and therefore speaks with some authority.

The building is just in its first stages, and work will begin actively about November 1. Most of the material has been shipped, and one feature alone will be the amount of steel to be used in re-inforcement of concrete. There will be thirty tons of it. C. H. Turner has been given the contract on a bid of \$24,500, and the building will be of absolute fireproof construction. It is the design of George M. Hopkinson, supervising architect of the San Carlos hotel, and by experts in the building line it was readily stated yesterday that the new school building will be equal to modern buildings in fireproof qualities.

There are eight class rooms, each designed to accommodate from fifty to sixty scholars, with a large assembly hall on the second floor. Each of these rooms has been fitted with ducts to exclude foul and draw in pure air, giving any amount of fresh air to each pupil. The exterior will have a pebble dash finish, with ornamental cement trimmings. Large doors on the north side and south side are on both the first and second floors, and outward, leading into exterior stair cases, permitting of emptying the building quickly.

Tampa, Oct. 11.—Much apprehension is felt for the safety of the Mallory line steamer Lampasas and the P. & O. steamer Olivette, the wireless trying to get both today but failed. The Lampasas was due here today at noon.

THREE THOUSAND WORKMEN IN AN EXPOSED POSITION

Miami, Fla., Oct. 11.—Efforts to communicate with nearly three thousand workmen at the construction camps on the lower keys, where there is but slight protection from the storm, failed. The graves, fears are entertained for their safety. During the storm of three years ago one hundred and forty were killed there.

\$2,000,000 DAMAGE IS DONE IN HAVANA

Havana, Oct. 11.—The most serious tornado since 1906 struck Cuba this morning, causing extensive devastation in the western portion of the island. Here many buildings were wrecked or unroofed and five persons were killed, one by an electric wire, and others by falling buildings. Twenty-five were injured. The greatest damage was in the harbor where nearly fifty small craft were either sunk or blown ashore.

At Casa Blanca great anxiety is felt today for the steamers Moro Castle from New York, and Miami from Key West, but both arrived safely this afternoon. The damage here is estimated at one million dollars.

AUTO DEALERS FINED ON PLEA

TWO OF THEM PLEADED GUILTY TO TECHNICAL VIOLATION, BUT COLLECTION SUSPENDED PENDING COMPLIANCE WITH NEWLY-FRAMED LAW.

Fines of \$5 and costs were placed on J. A. Wright and H. Packard, yesterday in the recorder's court, for technical violation of a comparatively new city statute regulating the storage of gasoline and other inflammable materials in the city. The fines were ordered suspended pending a compliance with the violated section. Both gentlemen pleaded guilty but will at once arrange their storage tanks and pumps in a manner that will meet safety requirements.

H. J. Lee, another auto dealer, up for violating ordinance No. 59, series 2, had his case continued. The charge against Mr. Lee is a little different from the other two. He is charged with violating new ordinance No. 59 by a failure to procure a permit to store gasoline in the city limits, and having more than 100 pounds of carbide on his premises.

The charge to which Messrs. Wright and Packard pleaded guilty was for storing gasoline in a tank not properly constructed.

"There was no intention of violating any law on the part of either of the above, and they were as ready to remedy any defects in the matter of safe storage as were the city officials."
