CHARGED WITH BOOZE SELLING

GEORGE ANDREWS, A GREEK, SERVED SENTENCE FOR SELLING LIQUOR ILLEGALLY IN CITY COURT, NOW HAS TWO LIKE CHARGES IN COUNTY.

About the most disconsolate white man in the city yesterday was George Andrews, a Greek, who, after serving one sentence and starting out to satisfy another, was transferred from the city to the county jail, where two charges for selling liquor without a license are docketed against him. In one case an information has been filed against Andrews for selling liquor without license.

In the city charge, he was convicted with little trouble. Operating a fruit stand and restaurant on South Palafox street two months ago, the officers suspected him of selling whiskey. Watching close, they became all the more convinced and set a trap into which he fell readily. He was arrested, convicted and sentenced to 30 days in jail and fined additionally \$251. An equivalent sentence of 60 days was imposed in lieu of the big fine, that being the limit of time which the recorder can impose. Of

Andrews was said to have been caught by county officers by the doors being forced open, and a quantity of beer was seized. He made bond, and while at liberty was surrendered by bondsmen after being caught selling, it is alleged, the second time. At any rate two charges for illegal selling, both of which are said to be well cupped, are standing against him. His incarceration for the past two months has told on him much, for he appears to have aged even in that short time. At one time in Pensacola he is said to have had considerable ready money.

EAR OF GREEK SNIPPED OFF

OFFENSE IS CHARGED TO SCOTT JACKSON, NEGRO WHO WAS FINED IN CITY AND IS IN THE COUNTY COURTS FOR DEADLY ASSAULT CHARGE.

A Greek restaurateur near the union depot is minus an ear today, or at least the whole of an ear, and Scott Jackson, a negro railroad switchman, was fined in the city court for it after a lively fight. Recorder Johnson imposed a fine of \$15 and costs. Soon after the city court session had ended, the aggrieved Greek went before Justice Nickelson and swore out a warrant charging Jackson with a deadly assault. The negro was placed in the county jail but was released yesterday afternoon on bond. Jackson, it was shown, was a patron at the Greek's place, his order consisting of five cents worth of fish. To make the negro delicacy all the more delectable and palatable, he called for pepper sauce. The condiment was said to have been too weak to suit the negro. Another bottle of sauce was produced and a quarrel started. Jackson shoved his hand in his pocket as if for the money but came back with an open knife with which the bloody carving operations were done. The Greek bled and yelled furiously.

RUNAWAY WAS DISASTROUS

AFFRIGHTED HORSE DASHED INTO FAST MOVING STREET CAR AND HURT SO BADLY THAT POLICE CAPTAIN SHOT THE ANIMAL.

Dashing wildly southward on Alcaniz street, a runaway horse belonging to Thos. Edwards, proprietor of a retail fish house, ran directly across the track of the Pensacola Electric Company at the Government and Alcaniz streets intersection, at 6:30 o'clock last evening and was struck by a street car, which was moving westward at a rapid rate. The animal was knocked down, its flesh badly lacerated, and one leg was broken. It suffered for about an hour when Police Captain Wilde came up and with the owner's consent shot the horse several times to put it out of its misery. The vehicle was badly damaged.

No blame was placed on the motor-man, as the gong was said to have been sounding incessantly as the car approached the Alcaniz street intersection. The only criticism of the car's operation was the fact that it usually approaches the sharp crossing at a rate altogether too rapid for absolute safety to fast moving vehicles from the north roadway.



The class of those people who frequent the municipal court most frequently are easily found inside of homes. "It is too cold for them to sleep on the grass in this season, and of course we hunt them in houses," said one veteran of the force.
