FLETCHER TALKS LORIMER CASE

SAYS TRAIL WILL BE FAIR TO ALL PARTIES—MOST OF THE HEARINGS WILL BE HELD IN WASHINGTON IF EFFORTS OF SENATOR PREVAIL.

Washington, June 10.—Senator D. U. Fletcher of Florida, who has been named as a member of the subcommittee on privileges and elections to investigate the Lorimer case, stated today that in all probability most of the hearings would be had in Washington.
"I shall favor a searching investigation," he said, "let it hit or involve whom it may. I shall favor the committee sitting here in Washington and away from any political influences that may prevail in Illinois. I shall call in every man who knows anything about the case from the highest to the lowest and make him tell what he knows whether he wants to tell or not and regardless of the consequences that may follow. I voted against the resolution unseating Mr. Lorimer before because I did not think from a close study of the evidence that it established the charges, but I feel perfectly free to go into this investigation and deal with it as a new case which will include all the former testimony and the newly discovered evidence it is claimed exists."


