El Paso, Tex., June 14.—The Mormon colony at San Antonio, Texas, fifty miles from Alpine, Texas, is being harassed by a band of twenty-five Magonista bandits under Zalazar, according to the reports brought here last night by Francisco Sanchez, who was the bearer of an appeal to Juarez authorities for military protection. Sanchez states that Zalazar's band is murdering, robbing and levying tribute and making occasional forays into Texas. Troops will be sent from Juarez to San Antonio, while Texas Rangers will guard the American side of the border.

MUDDY WATERS STOP FISHING FOR WEEK AND FIRST DAYS SALE AMOUNTED TO APPROXIMATELY TWO THOUSAND DOLLARS.

The Key West Journal says: As predicted in the Journal of Sunday morning the sponge market revived and there were a number of offerings totaling a neat sum.

Norberg Thompson brought twenty lots for which he paid \$67,881. Leland Brothers bought ten lots for which they paid \$50,228. George L. Barlum bought thirty-three lots for which he paid \$49,875. John Roberts bought thirty-one lots for which he paid \$41,000.

The total sales yesterday were \$1,228,154, a better market than has been witnessed for a week or more, the sponge fishermen being unable to hook the sponge on account of the muddy condition of the water.
