New York, April 19.—Cotton futures opened steady at a decline of 1/8 cent under realizing inspired by lower cables and better weather. The market was steady during the middle of the morning with prices four or five points up from the lowest on renewed covering. Cotton spot closed steady, 5 1/2 cents under yesterday's close, and a better weather map than expected. Trading was light in volume in the early hours, but to accept profits there was an increase in buying, but it did not stimulate buying. Rises news was unfavorable but the market had little buying power and longs showed more inclination to accept profits than to increase their lines. 
STOCK MARKET CLOSES STEADY

New York, April 19.—Without exception prices tended downward at today's opening. Dealings were light. Trading came almost to a full stop after the opening and the market dragged along with few changes of moment. The movement in the speculative issues was unimportant. Designation of the like of which the market has not witnessed in many weeks, prevailed during the morning session. Dealings were so light that it was absolutely no significance. Bonds were easier. Market conditions were virtually unchanged during the noon hour. Speculative selling caused heaviness in some of the favorite stocks but they rallied easily when these offerings ceased. St. Louis Southwestern consolidated 4 per cent bonds rose 3 points to 84 1/2. The market closed steady. Prices bounded strongly upward in the closing hour. All of the prominent stocks improved notably with an exception of General Electric, United States Steel and Union Pacific. Profit taking toward the end resulted in some recession.

Chicago, April 19.—Wheat bulged because of the closing of the Dardanelles. The opening was 58 to 7-8c higher, July started at \$1.07 1/2 to \$1.07 1/2-2, a gain of 3-8¢ to 2-3¢-7-8¢ and rose to \$1.07 3/4-4. Corn rallied on foreign news. The July option opened 1-4¢-5¢ to 1-2¢-5¢ up at 75 1/2-1/2, touched 75 1/2-3 and then advanced to 76 3/8c. Provisions sagged on a decline at the early initial sales were 5 to 10c down with September delivery, 15.67 1/2 for pork; \$10.52 1/2 to \$10.55 for lard and \$10.22 to 10.25 for ribs.

Copper is in good demand, as the result of electrical structural needs and at remunerative price. Coal is being exported for British steamships and money is undisturbed. The one thought is conservative progress. With losses, relatively awful, both of lives and property, the business sequel to the latter will be replacement. Conservative action is indicated.
