COMPLETE THE WORK ON PINE STREET WHARF

CITY DOCK WILL BE READY FOR USE EARLY THIS WEEK—WORK WELL UNDER WAY ON OTHER CITY WHARF AT MAGNOLIA STREET.

NEGRO LOSES HIS SUIT FOR FIFTEEN THOUSAND

Seattle, Wash., May 3.—A negro editor, Horace R. Clayton, today lost his suit for \$15,000 damages against a restaurant proprietor who asked the negro not to patronize the place. The judge upheld the defense's contention that Clayton was not deprived of his civil rights.

After the negro's first appearance in the restaurant, according to evidence, he was asked not to come again. When he did reappear, he was served, but he was not charged for the meal and again he was asked not to eat there.

MISSION FOR FOREIGNERS TO BE HELD TODAY

RUDOLPH KUNASZ, WHO SPEAKS SEVERAL LANGUAGES, WILL ATTEMPT TO INTEREST ITALIANS AND OTHERS WHO SPEAK NOR HARDLY UNDERSTAND ENGLISH.

A mission or meeting in the interest of the Italians and of other foreigners in the city will be opened Sunday afternoon at 3 o'clock on South Palafox street, corner Magnolia, on a vacant lot next to the Ray Hardware Company.

Mr. Rudolph Kunasz, of Chicago, of the Moody Training school, will preach and sing. He speaks in English, Italian and Austrian, and will be governed by his audience as to which language he uses, most likely speaking in English. The songs will be in English.

Again at 7 o'clock in the evening there will be preaching, and it will end before 8 o'clock to give time to attend churches. Then, every evening at 7:30 o'clock thereafter till further notice.

Christian people of all churches are earnestly requested to attend and aid in making this undertaking for our foreign brother a success. It has not been attempted here before. The work is undenominational in character. The Young People's Union of the First Baptist church raised the first amount to erect the platform and appoint a committee to look after that work. Other churches are likewise doing something to help care for the preacher. Besides this no organization is in control. Please ask Italian and foreign gentlemen who read English to translate this to those to whom they may be able.

SMALL HOUSE ON EAST CHASE STREET BURNS

CONGRESSMAN EMMETT WILSON WIRES FROM WASHINGTON THAT IMPORTANT DUTIES WILL DETAIN HIM AT THE NATIONAL CAPITAL.

THOUSANDS OF GALLONS OF CORN WHISKEY BURN

WOODEN STRUCTURE OF THE SILVER SPRINGS DISTILLING COMPANY DESTROYED BY AN EXPLOSION LAST NIGHT.

An explosion of corn whiskey in the warehouse of the Silver Springs Distilling Company on West Garden street, in the extreme western part of the city, about midnight last night set fire to the structure and the flames destroyed the building and a quantity of liquor on account of it being outside of the water limits.

The amount of whiskey destroyed and the loss sustained was not learned last night on account of H. C. Sprinkle, manager of the plant, being out of the city. The warehouse was a wooden structure.

J. C. McCABE, PROMINENT RAILROAD MAN, IS DEAD

Fort Worth, Texas, May 3.—J. C. McCabe, general freight agent of the Chicago, Rock Island and Pacific railroad, and brother of fourth vice-President McCabe of the Pennsylvania railroad system, died here today. He suffered a stroke of paralysis at San Antonio about a month ago. He is survived by his widow.

WILL MAINTAIN ORDER IN THE STRIKE DISTRICT

Charleston, W. Va., May 3.—In furtherance of his plans to maintain order in the strike regions of Cabin Creek, Governor Hatfield has appointed Major James I. Pratt, John Moore, a labor leader and Deputy Sheriff Z. H. Rowbridge to have absolute control of the police of the district and the only persons authorized to make arrests.

CARGO TIMBER MOST VALUED EVER SHIPPED

THE STEAMER STRATHCARRON CLEARS FOR PORTS IN SOUTH AFRICA WITH SHIPMENT OF THREE MILLION FEET VALUED AT \$80,000.

The most valuable cargo of sawn timber ever shipped from the gulf coast was cleared yesterday by the Pensacola Lumber Co., on the British steamer Strathcarron for Cape Town, Delagoa Bay, East London and other South African ports. The cargo aggregates about 3,000,000 feet and is valued at \$80,000.

The timber is to be used in some railroad construction work and is of special sizes. To secure these sizes an 8th grade of timber desired it was necessary to pay fancy prices for it, and this makes the shipment more valuable than ordinary timber. It is possible that at no other port could such an order have been filled.

BODIES OF FOURTEEN FLOOD VICTIMS FOUND

Clayton, La., May 3.—The bodies of fourteen victims of the steamboat disaster which cost the lives of nearly a score of people on the big river liner Concordia, had been recovered up to 7 o'clock this morning. Another victim, John Daniels, a negro, died of his injuries today and several others among the injured are expected to die.

Of the dead, only two are white, the others being negro flood refugees and negro members of the steamer's crew. The Concordia carried seventy-two negro flood refugees, twenty-three negro roustabouts, ten negro deck hands, ten white crew and five white passengers. After striking the railroad bridge across the Tombigbee river, the Concordia was carried down the river almost two miles before it sank in about twenty feet of water.
