

# CURLEY AND TWO SONS ARRESTED AT LIVE OAK, FLA.

### FORMER RESIDENTS OF PENSACOLA ARE CHARGED WITH PASSING WORTHLESS CHECKS IN THAT PLACE.

J. G. Gurley, a former resident of Pensacola, and his two sons, all of whom are well known in this city, are under arrest in Live Oak on the charge of passing worthless checks. The Gurleys are concrete sidewalk contractors and did considerable work in this city and so far as known, bore a good reputation. The Live Oak Democrat of yesterday contained the following regarding their arrest:

J. G. Gurley and two sons, Geo. R. Gurley and K. K. Gurley, who have been wanted here on a charge of passing worthless checks, were arrested last week by a deputy sheriff in Wauchoula and the sheriff was notified Saturday to come after them. They were brought here by Sheriff Pottsamer Tuesday and placed in jail.

These men, who claimed Birmingham as their home, were in Live Oak last fall doing concrete work and building sidewalks, but left here very suddenly after succeeding in having several checks cashed with no funds in the bank it is said. M. L. Burnett and J. M. Barclay were relieved of \$25 and \$15 respectively and several others are said to have been victims, though of smaller amounts.

The three left here in November and after a description of the men was sent out they were located in Tallahassee and Blountstown according to wires received here by the sheriff, but apparently left before they could be apprehended.

Mrs. Gurley, who lives in Bartow, arrived here Tuesday evening and returned home Wednesday.


