WILL LEO FRANK'S EXECUTION BE JUDICIAL MURDER? YES, SAY FRIENDS, WHO HOLD PROSECUTOR WAS UNFAIR, JURY INTIMIDATED

Atlanta, Ga., Dec. 30.—Will the state of Georgia send an innocent man to the gallows on January 11? It is Leo M. Frank, who must die on that day, guilty or innocent of the murder of fourteen-year-old Mary Phagan? Rarely in the history of American criminal jurisprudence has the entire nation been so thoroughly aroused over a murder case.

The facts in the case. Here are the facts upon which Frank was convicted: On the morning of Sunday, April 27, 1913, the body of Mary Phagan, a fourteen-year-old girl, was found in the basement of the pencil factory of which Frank was the superintendent by Newt Lee, the negro night watchman.

The Engineer and the "Surprise" Tests.

Notwithstanding the fact that the differences between the engineers and management of ninety-eight western railroads have been submitted to arbitration, formal notice has been served by Warren S. Stone, grand chief engineer of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers, that if the arbitration fails to regulate surprise tests so as to eliminate danger to the men, the engineers of the western railroads will go on strike to enforce their demands in this regard.

The question of surprise tests was one of the main questions at issue when the trouble with the western roads began some time since, and it would seem from the threat of Mr. Stone that he believes this phase of the situation will either be entirely ignored by the arbitration board or that it is the intention of its members to uphold the contention of the railroads that such tests are necessary.

The surprise test has been a bone of contention between railroads and engineers for many years, the railroads contending that the throwing of a danger signal directly ahead of an oncoming train tends to make the engineer more vigilant and the employees believe that such tests are not only unnecessary and trying to the nerves but that they tend to a relaxation of vigilance because of the fact that a danger signal may, or may not, mean that danger is at hand.
