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
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ANOTHER FORMER GERMAN LINER SINKS AT PIER



BROOKLYN—The S. S. Moccasin, property of the U. S. Shipping Board, and formerly the Prince Joachim of German registry, sank recently at her pier. It is believed that someone opened the vessel's sea-cocks. This makes the eighth former German ship, now owned by allied countries, that has gone down mysteriously.

MARKET REPORTS

New Orleans, March 12.—The cotton market opened steady. March, 33.50; May, 37.65; July, 34.36; October, 31.43; December, 30.58.

New York, March 12.—Cotton futures opened steady. March, 39.65; May, 36.60; July, 33.81; October, 31.50; December, 30.50.

Cotton closed steady. Closing bid, March, 39.99; May, 36.95; July, 34.22; October, 31.95; December, 30.55.

Liverpool, March 12.—Cotton spot in slightly better demand. Prices higher. Good middling, 30.65; fully middling, 29.65; middling, 28.65; low middling, 25.35; good ordinary, 22.15; ordinary, 21.15.

Sales, 5,000 bales, including 4,000 bales American. No receipts.

Futures closed steady. March, 26.42; May, 25.37; July, 24.39; October, 22.48; December, 21.64; January, 21.36.

New York, March 12.—A relatively strong market for cotton at Liverpool this morning was attributed to the decline in sterling exchange and early fluctuations here were irregular. The opening was steady at an advance of 15 points to a decline of 3 points, with active positions selling about 9 to 20 points net lower during the first few minutes. May eased off to 38.44 while new crop positions were relatively easy with October selling at 31.35 under realizing Wall street and southern selling. Prospects for clearing weather in the south may have contributed to the decline, but immediate weather conditions were unfavorable and the market steadied before the end of the first hour on renewed covering with May selling at 36.64 and October at 31.52.

There was probably some buying on the report of a prominent southern authority indicating domestic consumption for February of 521,000 bales against 443,000 last year, but business was much less active than yesterday with sentiment unsettled.

New Orleans, March 12.—First trades in the cotton market today were higher on the weather belt line and the cotton market gained 7 to 13 points on the opening. Almost immediately the market ran into selling of importance based on the slump of about 7 cents in the rates of sterling exchange and there was a fall to levels of 5 to 15 points under the close of yesterday. This was followed by a recovery and an advance of May to a level 12 points over yesterday's close on the forecast of much colder weather for the western belt.

The advance in May continued until it amounted to 20 points, but finally offerings became heavy enough to cause a reaction and late in the morning prices were at net advances of but 1 to 13 points. Selling was due mainly to the reaction downward in

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
