MORE THAN ONE HUNDRED TO FINISH AT A. AND M.

Agricultural College, Miss., May 1.—May 30th, commencement day at the A. and M. College, when more than one hundred members of the Senior class will receive their B. C. degrees, will bring to a close what is conceded to be the most efficient and successful year in the history of the Agricultural and Mechanical College. According to a report given out by Hugh Critz, Registrar, the prospective graduates will be divided between the different schools as follows: 63 in agriculture, 24 in engineering, 7 in general science and 10 in industrial education. In addition to these there are several post graduate students who will receive master of science degrees.

Hon. P. P. Claxton, of Washington, D. C., United States Commissioner of Education and nationally appreciated speaker, has been secured by President G. R. Hightower to deliver the commencement address. On Sunday, May 28, Dr. T. S. Clyce, President of Austin College, Sherman Texas, will preach the commencement sermon. Features of the program for Monday, May 29, will be the vocational addresses by members of the graduating class contesting for the Albert Critz Memorial Medal, the annual alumni address by Hon. J. W. Fox, of Scott, Miss., manager of the Delta Planting Company, and the tri-annual banquet of the A. and M. College Alumni Association, at which fully 200 of the old "grads" are expected to review the "good old days."
