#### Sharp Deterioration in Crop.

The Times-Picayune on Monday, presented its correspondents' reports on the cotton crop, as of September 7. The consensus of opinion is to the following effect:

1. A very sharp deterioration has occurred since the previous report taking the belt as a whole, and the accounts from some districts are distressing.
2. The boll weevil has wrought havoc over wide areas, more especially in Alabama and Mississippi.
3. The supply of labor is reported sufficient in most cases, but there appears to be a scarcity wherever the weevil has done its worst, as laborers have been driven to seek a living in the towns, or on public works.
4. Farmers seem generally disposed to sell at current prices at least enough of the crop to pay them out of debt, but would doubtless resist any important decline.

#### Cattle Market Report.

St. Louis Mo., September 18th.—Cattle: The run today aggregated 10,000 head. Good steers found favor at steady prices, but common to medium varieties moved slowly at 10 to 15 cents decline. Butcher cattle sold about steady with last week's close, while the inquiry for stockers and feeders continued broad enough to sustain the market, and considering the day's heavy run, it was a very fair market all around.

Hogs: Today's run 6,500. Choice heavy corn hogs scarce and in favor selling fully 10 cents higher than Saturday, top 11.50. A big share of the receipts were the usual Monday varieties from Southwest territory of the common and light-weight kind. They sold generally steady. Bulk of the good hogs 180 pounds up \$11 to \$11.30; 150 to 180 pounds \$10.50 to \$11; 130 to 140 pounds \$9.75 to \$10.25; lighter pigs \$7.50 to \$9.50; best rough hogs \$9.75 to \$10; half-fat rough hogs \$8.50 to \$9.25.

Sheep: Receipts 3,500. Lambs broke 25 to 40 cents per cwt., compared with last week's close, one lb. the bunch at \$10.65 representing the extreme top of the market. Bulk of the good lambs sold \$10.25 up; best culls \$7.50; light skippy cull \$5.50 to \$7; sheep steady, fat kinds \$7 to \$7.50; choppers and bucks \$5.50; canners \$3 to \$4. Best black-faced breeding ewes \$8.50 to \$9; good No. 1's and 2's mixed \$8.25 to \$8.75. Fat goats \$5 to \$5.50; half fat \$4 to \$5; canners \$3 to \$3.50.

#### What's in My Soil?

Is my farm alfalfa land? What kind of soil is this? What's in it? These are the questions that every land owner finds forcing themselves on him in these days when farming is done more or less by chemical formulas. These questions and many others are satisfactorily answered in "The Soils of Mississippi," a bulletin recently published by Dr. W. N. Logan of the geology department of the Mississippi A. & M. College.

This bulletin not only tells how soils are formed by time and the effects of water, freezing, dead plants and animals, and other agencies, but shows your county in a well prepared map of the soil areas of the state and tells what the contents of the soil are, and what crops are adapted to section.
