

Fashionable Sweater Coats



The sweater, that summer and winter companion of the outdoor girl, is no fair-weather friend. But, nevertheless, it has taken its cue from the suit coat this summer, and is made in several very attractive styles that open down the front and demand a vest or blouse to be worn with them. These vests are not always of the substantial kind, but are varied, according to the demands of occasion and weather. Sometimes they are of crisp organdie and lace and sometimes of plain weaves in fiber silk. It is the vest that adapts the sweater coat to the day and the occasion.

The last word in these attractive late-summer sweaters is spoken and the picture above conveys it to you. Of the two models shown, the one at the right is the most novel. It is made of fiber silk, knitted (by machinery) in a wonderfully pretty fancy stitch, with a facing that forms a collar in a simpler stitch. The belt is knitted to match the facing, and one end of it slips through a slide in the other end; both are pointed and fasten with a loop over a pearl button. The cuffs and a border about the bottom of the sweater are knitted in still another stitch, and a narrow band of black introduced in them gives a sharp and brilliant color contrast. This sweater is made in several bright colors—

rose the favorite, with yellow and turquoise following. It is shown with a lace vest so that a blouse can be dispensed with on warm days. When the weather is cooler a blouse replaces the vest.

The same model is shown in the sweater at the left, but it is knitted in a ribbed pattern and of wool yarn. The belt is supported at the sides by narrow straps which it slips through, and is adjusted lower than in the sweater at the right. The models are shapely and fine, and there is a neatness about them that is devoutly to be wished—in sweaters.

Council met pursuant to adjournment, present, D. S. McClanahan, Mayor G. Y. Banks, L. W. Stevens, L. A. Vaughan, E. E. Chappell, J. B. Love, and S. M. Nash, Councilmen. Councilman Chappell introduced the following ordinances, the same being duly seconded was unanimously adopted:

AN ORDINANCE.

Requiring property owners abutting on the streets and avenues to be paved, to remove, and substitute galvanized pipes in place of the iron pipes now connecting their several lots with the public mains of the city.

Sec. 1. BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF COLUMBUS, MISSISSIPPI: that beginning within the next ensuing term (10) days after the adoption of this ordinance, and continuing uninterruptedly until the work is finished, all water and gas pipes of iron along such parts of the streets and avenues as are ordered to be paved, must be removed and replaced by galvanized pipes.

Sec. 2. BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED, THAT, the galvanized pipes provided for in the foregoing section of this Ordinance, are to be of not less than one inch in diameter, and are to have slope to the main pipe of not less than one foot, and to be not less than one inch on said main pipe.

Sec. 3. BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED THAT, before the laying of said galvanized pipe, the same, as also the manner of laying it shall be subject to inspection by the City engineer, and receive his "O. K." before being placed in connections.

Sec. 4. BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED THAT, this Ordinance applies to, and embraces each and every lot of property abutting on said street and avenues, whether or not improved.

DAINED THAT, all water and gas pipes shall be laid not less than 18 inches in depth below the established grade of the streets or avenues in and along which same are laid.

Sec. 6. BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED THAT, all sewer, water or gas pipes laid as aforesaid, shall be in accordance with the provisions of this Ordinance; and all persons, firms, corporations, or companies owning or laying such pipes, are hereby required to observe and comply with same. Any such parties violating any of the provisions thereof, shall, on conviction before the Mayor, be subject to a fine of not less than ten, nor more than fifty dollars, for each and every such offense.

Sec. 7. BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED THAT, Whenever it is necessary to place any drain pipe under any permanent cement, stone or other material, the drain pipe shall be driven through the earth under the pavement without disturbing the surface of the pavement whenever the same be practicable; and if it be not practicable to so drive the pipe, then, and in such case the necessary excavation shall be bored with a post-hole auger, or with a similar tool, and not dug, and if this method be impracticable, then the necessary excavation may be dug, without in either case disturbing the pavement; and in no case shall a permit be given to tear up a pavement or street, except in cases where neither of the foregoing methods is practicable, the same to be decided by each and every case by the officer authorized to grant the permit.

Sec. 8. BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED THAT, any person apprehended disturbing in any manner the surface or pavement of any street or avenue, alley, or sidewalk, shall be subject to arrest, unless a written permit, as required by the foregoing sections, be exhibited by such person to the officer making the arrest.

Sec. 9. BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED THAT, in the event of the failure of any person, company or corporation complying with the provisions of this ordinance as to removing and replacing the designated piping, then in the event the Mayor and City council may proceed to have said work done at the expense of the defaulting person, company or corporation, which expense shall operate as a lien on the said lot or lots of such person, company or corporation, and be collected by the Marshal in due course.

Sec. 10. BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED, that this Ordinance take effect and be in force from and after its adoption.

This being the time appointed to take up the matter of certain changes in the Street car lines and there being several citizens present, all were given the opportunity to present their views.

After a full discussion of the matter it was moved to grant the changes requested by the Street Car Company, the same being duly seconded was unanimously adopted.

The proposed changes are as follows:
Take up all tracks on Third street South, all on College street from

Third to Seventh street; all tracks on Market street; all trackage on Third avenue North to the intersection of Eighth street and 3rd. avenue.

Privilege is granted Street Car Company of laying trackage on 8th St. North from the intersection of Main and Eighth street; to the intersection of 3rd Ave. and 8th St. North, and to lay trackage on 7th St. South, from the intersection of Main and Seventh St., to the intersection of College and Seventh St. South.

The water Committee was authorized and directed to order the necessary boiler tubes for the water works.
