

Many Volunteers Offer for Service

Aim of Baptist 75 Million Campaign For 5,000 Additional Workers Is More Than Reached.

The Baptist 75 Million Campaign will have plenty of workers to carry out the enlarged program of the denomination when the funds have been raised. Dr. L. R. Scarborough, general director, announces, following the holding of special enlistment services in the Baptist school and churches of the South. A minimum of 5,000 additional ministers, missionaries, Christian teachers, doctors, nurses and other special workers was asked for and while the response from the enlistment services is not complete, the indication is that the number of volunteers greatly exceed the minimum sought.

From twenty of the 132 Baptist educational institutions in the South, here came the information of 2,000 volunteers for Christian service wherever God might direct, and the indications are that the minimum of new workers sought will be realized from the colleges alone. The response from the church promise to be equally liberal. Baylor College, Belton, Tex., led in the number of contributions to special service with a total of 430, while Bossie Bethel College, Russellville, Ky., 36; with 63 additional ones agreeing to take God into partnership with them in their business and professional careers; Gibson-Merger College, Bowman, Ga., 28; Howard Payne College, Brownwood, Tex., 14; Baylor University, Waco, Tex., 18, and Oklahoma Baptist University, Shawnee, Okla., 57.
