This amount will have to be apportioned to the schools, roads etc., and the Revenue Agent's commission of twenty per cent will also have to be deducted from it.  
City Marshal Lincoln informs us that the City will receive about \$4500.00, less the Revenue Agent's commission. There are 259 delinquents in this county and five of them pay half of this amount and the other half is distributed between the other 254. The collecting officers have collected about half of the amount due and all unpaid after thirty days from the date of the notice will be assessed with damages.
