Sir:—I have received your letter of the 8th inst. relating to the levy, or Mr. Swortwouts interest in the lands of Mississippi under the distress warrant against him and his sureties.
I have also received the report of the District Attorney on the subject; in which he confirms your representation in regard to the lands belonging to the Boston and New York Chicleysaw Land Company, and I have therefore written to Mr. Butterworth, the District Attorney for the Northern District of Mississippi, directing that instructions may be given to the Marshal to withdraw the levy from the lands of the Company and also to file of record in the office of the clerk of the District Court, where the levy is recorded a supplementary return to that effect.
