In the summer of 1848 a bill passed both houses of Congress organizing a territorial government for Oregon; and in conformity with the wishes of the people of that Territory, and the principles of the Missouri Compromise, a clause was included to exclude slavery. Mr. POLK, wishing to carry out the Missouri Compromise which had been acquiesced in by the people for thirty years, gave his sanction to the bill; and immediately every whig orator and press in the South, although warmly opposed to the "Veto Power," began a crusade against him, equalled in bitterness only by their denunciations of him for sustaining his Country's rights against Mexico. He was denounced as an "Abolitionist," a "Traitor," and every opprobrious epithet heaped upon him that could be found in rich vocabulary of whig scurrility.

In the summer of 1849, President Taylor in violation of the constitution issued an edict declaring the laws of Mexico to be in force in California; and to support this kingly edict, he has appointed a military officer civil Governor, to enforce these tyrannical laws at the point of the bayonet. It is a well known fact that these laws prohibit slavery, and yet not one whig is heard to denounce this high-handed outrage upon the Constitution and the rights of the South. Where is the Vicksburg Whig, and other whig journals, that were so ready to denounce the conduct of Mr. Polk? Come out gentlemen, with your thunderbolts, and direct a few of them at the "heroic" personage of the "second Washington!"
