

Luke Lea.—Gen. Quitman,—State Stock—planters Bank

A simple statement of the facts, taken from the public records, will relate the wanton and ridiculous charge which Mr. Luke Lea, is busily circulating throughout the State—that Gen. Quitman was the main instrument of the total loss of the Sinking Fund, which would have extinguished the debt for the Planters Bank, that "his financial policy in reference to the transfer of the State Stock in the Planters Bank to the Natchez Rail Road and Banking Company, resulted in the loss," &c. &c.

A total stranger to the facts of the case would infer from these charges that Gen. Quitman was the sole parent of the "Transfer Act," as it is called, and that the Natchez Rail Road Bank became possessed of the Sinking Fund and wasted it, when, in truth Gen. Quitman had no share whatever in the passage of the "Transfer Act" and the evidences of debt due the sinking fund never parted from the control of the President and Cashier of the Planters Bank until they were forced from them by the State Commissioners. They relinquished their grip with undisguised reluctance.

The "Transfer Act" was introduced into the legislature by a whig Senator from Hinds, and it passed both houses, receiving a mixed support from both political parties. In the House, 28 whigs voted for it, and 23 democrats—Thirteen democrats and only four whigs opposed it. In the Senate, nine whigs and eight democrats supported the bill. Six democrats and only three whigs opposed it. Gen. Quitman was not a member of either branch of the legislature. Go. McNeil was then the chief executive officer and approved the bill. It is well known that he did so because he believed with others of his party that it gave additional security against loss, inasmuch as the act made the "Railroad and all the property, effects and credits of the company" liable, to "seizure for the payment of the bonds."

Such are the plain unvarnished facts of the history of the introduction and passage of the "Transfer Act." It in no wise effected the Sinking Fund, that remained with the planters Bank. The State stock only was transferred that moved to be more moon shine, and could not be sold. It remains yet unimpaired, so far as the "Transfer Act" ever affected its value. The Sinking Fund also remains in its former condition, save when occasionally some luckless pet of the Planters Bank in the day of its glory, falls into the clutches of the vigilant State commissioner. Neither Gen. Quitman or the Natchez Rail Road Bank ever had the slightest control over the sinking fund.

We might have dismissed this matter with fewer words, but we did not wish to deprive the whig Jupiter of all his thunder without due ceremony. Does he wish to know what has become of the Sinking Fund? Then we say to him, go consult your whig brethren, Walworth and Mandeville, of Natchez. Has he yet to learn that the Planters Bank was helplessly insolvent at the time of the passage of the "Transfer Act"? Then we say to him you are veridical indeed. Go consult the boys in the streets concerning the history of those times in Mississippi.—Mississippian.
