CONFEDERATE VETERANS

Ejected Col. Holder of This City, Major-General.

Vicksburg Chosen as Place of Next Meeting—Times Changed to July.

Meridian, Dec. 11.—Mississippi Division United Confederate Veterans concluded its annual session at Meridian yesterday. Although the attendance was not large, the proceedings were full of interest. Several excellent addresses were made. In the afternoon Col. McIntosh fully explained the proposition of Chas. B. Rouss, of New York, to erect a memorial hall, as a depository for Confederate records and relics, and the several camps.

Memorials to the Legislature were adopted for a Confederate Soldiers Home and for the collection and preservation of the records of Mississippians in the war. The time of annual meeting was changed to July, and the next session will be held at Vicksburg.

Col. W. D. Holder was unanimously elected Major-General of the Division; Col. D. A. Campbell, of Vicksburg, and W. D. Cameron, of Meridian, Brigadier-Generals; Major S. B. Watts, of Meridian, Adjutant General and chief of staff.

A sumptuous banquet at Sheehan hall closed the session; prior to which the veterans and a large local audience listened with delight to a lecture on Robt. E. Lee, by President Andrews, of Brown University, Providence, R. I.

THE SOLID SOUTH.

A Paucity of Debts and Plenty of Hog and Hominy.

A well known traveling man, a native Mississippian whose territory embraces the States of Louisiana, Arkansas and Mississippi, was in the city Thursday night, homeward bound after making the grand round of his territory, and gave a C. H. man the sum and substance of his observations in the following pithy sentences: "I never saw the country in such condition. The cotton crop is all out of the fields and while it is not a large one it has placed the people on their feet. Wherever I have been I found the country swarming with hogs and corn, the negroes well-fed and contented, the mules getting fat on full rations and the people out of debt and with money in their pockets. I have made it a point to ask those with whom I came in contact whether they were going to let the present fair price of cotton make fools of them another year and the emphatic reply in every instance, has been that cotton will be planted with the expectation of getting five cents per pound for it, and that there will be the same attention paid to the corn crop as in 1895. They had seen, they said, the old all cotton policy and were not to be misled by it again.

"You may know the people are well off," he said, "when I tell you that men selling boots and shoes, dry goods and clothing and fancy groceries report the heaviest trade they have ever known, but there is a serious feature of the situation. The farming communities are in such condition that credit will be in little demand and what the merchants in that line of business are to do I don't know. One of the largest dealers in Arkansas told me that all his customers had paid their debts, not even a negro owed him a cent, and the worst of it is that I have been in the credit business all my life, and don't know how to carry on a cash business and my customers won't need any.

His case is not singular, for one of the largest merchants and bankers in Mississippi told me that the demand for loans had so decreased in his territory that he had practically made no money during the present year and saw a worse outlook ahead for 1896."—Vicksburg Commercial-Herald.
