WHIG MEETING IN YALOBUSHA COUNTY.

Agreeably to previous notice, a meeting of the Whig citizens of Yalobusha county convened at the Court House in Coffeeville, on the 21st day of August, 1843, for the purpose of expressing their views as to the right of the State of Mississippi, under existing laws, to be represented upon the floor of the lower house of the next Congress; and to make known the names of the individuals by whom they would prefer to be represented.

On motion,
J. T. Leigh, Esq., was called to the Chair, and in like manner, J. H. Hutchins, Esq., was requested to act as Secretary.
The Chairman having briefly and pertinently explained the object of the meeting, E. S. Fisher, Esq., rose and addressed the meeting at some length, and after very ably demonstrating the right of Mississippi to a full representation in the lower house of Congress, although no legislative division of her territory into districts has been made, introduced the following resolutions, which were unanimously adopted:

Resolved, That in the opinion of this meeting, the State of Mississippi, notwithstanding the failure of her legislature to district her territory in obedience to the provisions of the apportionment act of the last Congress, still possesses the right to send her delegates to the Representative Hall of Congress.

Resolved, That a committee of five of the members of this meeting be appointed by the Chair, whose duty it shall be, by circular or some other mode of general publication, to express to the people of the State, the reasons that induce this meeting to believe the State of Mississippi is not disfranchised either by the apportionment act of Congress, or the disregard of our State Legislature to its provisions.

In obedience to the last resolution, the Chair appointed the following gentlemen said committee, viz:
E. S. Fisher, S. Barnes, J. H. Hutchins, Alfred Turner, and James Cook, Esqrs.

On motion,
The name of the Chairman was added to said committee.
The following resolutions were proposed by S. Barnes, Esq., and received the unanimous approbation of the meeting:

Resolved, That this meeting have full confidence in the patriotism, integrity and ability of the Hon. B. F. Caruthers, of Carrollton, Gen. A. B. Bradford, of Holly Springs, Hon. Thomas Armat, of Natchez, and Hon. P. W. Tompkins, of Vicksburg, and do warmly recommend them to the people of Mississippi as

suitable candidates for seats in the House of Representatives of the next Congress.

Resolved, That the committee already appointed, be requested, in addition to their other duties, to correspond with the nominees of this meeting, and learn of them if it will comport with their convenience and wishes to become candidates for the stations designated.

Resolved, That the proceedings of this meeting be published in the "Grenada Herald," "Pondola Register," and "Hornet," printed at Carrollton.
