

WORKING FOR A LIVING.

They give little thought to the interest-bearing power of money except when in danger of being caught in a squeeze, they have to make a borrow.

By developing and scheming they increase their income and would ridicule the idea of depending upon the slow process of lending out money at interest. THE CHARTER

OF Incorporation of E. B. Hall Medicine Company.

ARTICLE 1. That E. B. Hall, Addison Hall, Corinne Hall and W. A. Houston, and other associates who may become stockholders, be and are hereby created a body corporate and politic by the name and style of The E. B. Hall Medicine Company, for the purpose of manufacturing and vending drugs, proprietary and patent medicines.

ARTICLE 2. The capital stock of said corporation shall not be less than Five Thousand (\$5,000) Dollars, and shall not exceed the sum of Ten Thousand (\$10,000) Dollars, the same to be divided into shares of One Hundred (\$100.00) each, and said shares shall be non-assessable, and when the sum of Five Thousand (\$5,000) Dollars shall have been paid in, the said stockholders may meet and elect their board of directors.

ARTICLE 3. The offices of said corporation shall be managed by a board of directors, a majority of whom shall constitute a quorum and they shall elect a president, secretary and treasurer.

ARTICLE 4. The said Board of Directors shall have full and ample power to make all by-laws regulating the time, place and manner of the meeting of the stockholders, the election of the Board of Directors, the president, secretary and treasurer, their tenure of office, to divide and declare dividends out of the profits of said corporation, and carry out its purpose and objects as set forth in Article 1 herein.

ARTICLE 5. The secretary and treasurer shall have the care and custody of all moneys of the corporation, and shall give bond with good security to faithfully account for the same, the amount of said bond, and the security to be approved by the said Board of Directors.

ARTICLE 6. That in the election of the said Board of Directors, and in all the business of said corporation, each stockholder shall be entitled to one vote for each share that he holds. The majority of the votes to control. Absent stockholders or directors may be represented by proxy in writing, and no transfer of stock to be considered final, until regularly entered on the books of the corporation, when the original shall be surrendered by or to the said Board of Directors, who, all things being equal, shall have the preference in the purchase of the same, and pay for the same out of the profits of said corporation. Said stock so purchased shall be cancelled.

ARTICLE 7. That should any stockholder desire to sell his or her stock or any part thereof, he or she shall give reasonable notice thereof to the said Board of Directors, who, all things being equal, shall have the preference in the purchase of the same, and pay for the same out of the profits of said corporation. Said stock so purchased shall be cancelled.

ARTICLE 8. No stockholder of said corporation shall be individually liable for the debts of the same, except to the amount of the balance that may remain due or unpaid for the stock subscribed by him or her, and no further.

ARTICLE 9. That said corporation shall hold all real estate necessary for the purpose of carrying on its business, and for this purpose shall have the power to establish agencies in this, or adjoining states.

ARTICLE 10. That the said E. B. Hall Medicine Company shall have its domicile at the town of Okolona, county of Chickasaw, state of Mississippi, and its charter may continue for 50 years.

ARTICLE 11. This charter of incorporation shall be in full force and effect from and after the approval of the same by the Governor or as contemplated by Chapter 25 of the Annotated Code of 1892 under the provisions of which chapter this corporation is organized and all the provisions of such chapter so far as the same are applicable shall be a part of this charter of incorporation. All indebtedness due by or to the corporation shall be so made that it shall be payable in any kind of legal tender money of the United States.
