SABBATH OBSERVANCE.



It takes a long time for some people to learn that the Sabbath was made for man, and not man for the Sabbath. This sentiment was enunciated almost 2,000 years ago by the highest religious authority. How little effect it has on the view of some sectarian minds is illustrated by the fact that the opening of the St. Louis world's fair on Sunday has practically been prevented through pressure brought to bear on congress. Sunday is the only day on which large classes of people can attend an exhibition of that kind. It is admittedly desirable and beneficial that they should attend. But the denial of the only chance they would have to do so was strenuously insisted on for no particular reason except that the opening of the gates on Sunday is opposed to certain ideas of religious duty.

Broader views regarding the observance of the first day of the week are becoming more widely prevalent, however, than such incidents would indicate. Discussion of the subject in the religious press shows that a marked change in the ideas of prominent leaders and high authorities is taking place. The London Guardian recently contained an interesting editorial in which liberal opinions were expressed, conceding that the old theory, based on "biblical precedent" has become inoperative and called for "a careful investigation and an authoritative statement of the Christian principles on which the observance of the Lord's day ought to rest." The Congregationalist, in an article which is somewhat surprising for the advanced views expressed, declared in favor of "such use of public libraries, picture galleries and museums as we make of our own libraries and art treasures on Sunday." It even advocated open parks on Sunday, adding however: "To provide what the people need for a useful Sabbath, especially in crowded cities, requires that many should labor. It is our duty to see that such labor is limited to service in providing a helpful Sabbath to others, and that those who thus work shall have compensation in rest." The Boston Pilot, a Roman Catholic periodical approves the Congregationalist's sentiments.

When the church generally gets abreast of these common sense views a long step will have been taken in the right direction. Nothing could be more undesirable than that the Sabbath should be abolished, or become obsolete. It is one of the most valuable institutions of Christian countries, from both a religious and a practical view point. But some very narrow opinions have long been held in regard to it. It was established as a blessing to mankind. The old blue laws made it a weariness and a curse. Much of the disrespect which people of the present generation feel and express for it is due to reaction from the straight-laced manner in which they were compelled to observe it when children.

The old-fashioned Sabbath, which some good people wish they could recall, is gone forever. Nor is it desirable, from any point of view, that it should be brought back. Its rest was too often more unsalutary and irksome than hard labor; its piety too often pious fraud. Sunday should be made truly a day of recreation, in the best sense of the word—recreation for mind as well as for body, for the social nature as well as for the soul. The day may be profitably spent in reading, driving, nature study, social intercourse or any other restful employment that tends to keep a sane, healthy mind in a healthy vigorous body. With these things as accessories, the act of worship itself will be rendered more pleasant, wholesome and morally stimulating. All further attempts to keep sensible people in straight-jackets on a day which was set apart in the divine economy for the highest, noblest and most beneficial purpose will probably be unsuccessful and the church may save itself the humiliation of failure and perform a meritorious service by ceasing its efforts to bring back the "good old days" of interminable sermons and cold Sunday dinners, and exerting itself to induce the people to expend in harmless and innocent ways, energies which they seem determined to exercise on Sunday, and which, if not given a right direction, may turn the day into one of dissipation and crime instead of one of rest and improvement.
