A very serious break occurred in the levee on the Louisiana side near Natchez Sunday. This will cause the overflow of most of four parishes.

Congressman Sisson made a very strong speech in the House Monday in support of proposed alien land laws of California. His talk was straight from the shoulder and had the right ring to it. Mr. Sisson is opposed to alien ownership of land, and he is right. We have race problems enough already; no others should be built up simply because some other country wants a place to dump her surplus population.

The spectacle of the Secretary of State hurrying across the United States to California to protest against the passage of the proposed alien land laws simply because Japan opposed the passage is a humiliation which the country should not receive with good grace. California has a right and it is her duty to pass such laws as her people demand regardless of what Mr. Wilson may think or attempt to do. Then if Japan wants to get up a scrap because of these laws, let Uncle Sam give her a dose of the medicine that awoke her and made her acquainted with the outside world. Japan seems to be itching for a scrap with us. Now, let's talk scrap some ourselves.

Circuit Court convened here Monday morning with all the officers on hand ready to take their respective places and attend to their several duties. Judge Mahon began with dispatch to organize the session for the business and by the noon hour every thing was in working order.

The charge to the grand jury was strong especially with respect to the sale of intoxicating liquors. Among other features of this the Court paid his respects to that class of church member who soak booze and patronize blind tigers.

So far most of the cases to come to trial were of minor importance. The Carter case which was of most concern to the public has not been set for trial because of the absence of Mr. C. C. Jolly, the State's most important witness. Compulsory process was issued for him but it is understood that he is out of the state and therefore, not within the jurisdiction of this court.

We will give an account of the proceedings after adjournment.

In the contests Okolona made a good showing, better than for several years past, winning first place in music, second in girls' tennis and second in the relay race, while we lost out in elocution the work of Miss Sadie Albee Davis was so excellent that she has received many compliments and the training shown was the means of bringing to her teacher, Mrs. Touquin Stovall, a pupil from another town.

In reporting the proceedings of the first session of the Woman's Suffrage Convention which met in Jackson on April 15th, the Clarion-Ledger makes the following personal mention of Mrs. Fannie Clark, of this city, who responded on behalf of the State Association to the address of welcome:

"The speaker is a middle-aged lady of soft voice and pleasing manner, but she deceived her even tempered appearance, for hidden beneath is a brain as acute, a brain as sharp as was ever given to any master of debate and a tongue that is especially apt in giving venom to the keenest swords of sarcasm. It was the case when she told of a Methodist preacher who decried 'woman suffrage.' Said the speaker: 'This was a good man and yet I heard him say, with his hand on the back of the Bible, 'So help me God, if my wife ever votes I will quit her.' This devious government of the people for the people and by the people and the 'women are people.'"

The meetings of the association were held in the senate chamber, which was well filled at each session. The magnitude of the meeting was a surprise to many who had not kept a touch with the movement in this state. The President reported that the membership had more than doubled in the last year. Among the membership were to be found representatives from almost every nook and corner of the state and several from other states.

It was decided to try to secure the passage of a resolution at the next meeting of the Legislature to submit an amendment to our constitution granting women the right to vote.
