**GOSPEL OF THE PLOW IN INDIA**

AGRICULTURAL MISSION WORK IN LAND WHERE EIGHTY PER CENT OF PEOPLE GET THEIR LIVING OUT OF THE SOIL.

One-Third Never Get Enough to Eat From Cradle to Grave.



Professor Sam Higginbotham, a missionary of the Presbyterian Board of Foreign Missions, Professor of Agriculture in the Ewing Christian College, Allahabad, India, and superintendent of the leper asylum in that place. His splendid efforts have attracted the attention and enlisted the interest of people the world over. Eighty per cent of the people of India get their living out of the soil, and Professor Higginbotham believes that India will forever remain, primarily, an agricultural country.

India has a growing season twelve months in the year, so that with rotation of crops, proper cultivation of the soil and irrigation, the soil will never be idle.

The poverty of India is appalling. Professor Higginbotham says that one third of India's great population of 315,000,000 never know from the cradle to the grave, what it is to have enough to eat. Over 100,000,000 of them live at the rate of one cent a day per capita.

Speaking of his work in India Professor Higginbotham says: "My Indian neighbors are raising only six or eight bushels of wheat per acre. There is the same soil, with the same amount of sunshine and rain, the only difference being in the method of cultivation and in the seed chosen."

**Baptist Gifts for Missions.**  
The handsome sum of \$2,600 was given on missionary day in the Sunday school in the First Baptist church of Dallas, Texas, of which Rev. George Truett is the pastor. This sum represented the offering to Home and Foreign Missions from 1,500 givers.

The plan now in operation by the Southern Baptists to observe every year what is known as "Missionary Day in the Sunday School" has proved to be a most effective and efficient plan for increasing the interest as well as enlarging the gifts to Home and Foreign Missions. Through this machine more than one and a half million people are reached on this day with the highest grade of missionary information. It is considered by those who inaugurated and who are forwarding this splendid plan that one of its greatest advantages is its educational value. While the machine itself is simple enough, representatives of the three great boards of the southern Baptist convention—the Home and Foreign Mission and Sunday School boards—plan and work for missionary day in the Sunday School for six months prior to the event. The result is that on this day the great cause of missions is emphasized in every Baptist Sunday School in the South.


The idea of setting apart one day in the year as "Missionary Day in the Sunday School" was conceived by Dr. I. J. Van Ness, of the Sunday School board, in 1907. However, it was only in 1913 that the three boards cooperated effectively in the general observance of this day.

It was estimated that gifts on "Missionary Day in the Sunday School in 1913 approximated \$50,000 while those from the same source in 1914 probably reached the \$100,000 mark. Leaders in this movement believe that this year missionary day in Sunday Schools will result in gifts amounting to \$150,000 and, while it is impossible to tell the exact amount given, it seems practically certain that the sum will not be far from \$150,000.




