Pursuant to call, something more than a hundred citizens met at the court house Tuesday and organized a produce exchange for the purpose of handling grain, hay, fruits, vegetables, poultry and livestock. The meeting was called to order by Mr. B. Gulick, who stated the object of the meeting and introduced Mr. E. L. Robison, market agent of the M. & O. Mr. Robison made a short talk on the advantages to be derived through co-operative marketing and then set himself up as an answerer of questions relating to markets and their methods when every thing from containers to a canning factory was discussed.

The question then came up as to the feasibility of such an organization as was outlined, and it was the unanimous sense of the meeting that the organization should be formed at this time, which was done by electing G. H. Phelps, president; B. Gulick, Secretary; R. A. Hawkins, W. H. Neubern, L. F. Prather, John Schmidt and Ed Martin, board of directors. Quite a number signed the roll of membership.

The meeting adjourned to meet July 12th at 2 P. M.
