SIGNAL SOUNDED ON OPENING OF CANAL

FOR THE EXPLOITATION OF MISSISSIPPI'S GREAT NATURAL RESOURCES.

NO BETTER WAY TO PURPOSE

Mississippi's Centennial Exposition To Be Held at Gulfport—Automatically Becoming the Gateway to the Orient.

Mississippi's seaport city automatically becoming the gateway to the Orient by the opening of the Panama Canal, the completion of that gigantic project would seem just the proper signal for a worldwide exposition of this State's great natural resources. Far too long has one of the most lavishly endowed commonwealths in the universe been known as a lumber state to the exclusion of other more permanent advantages. A growing sheep raising industry would add wool and suet to the commercial output.

This and much more of possibility is Mississippi's God-given wealth which needs only adequate capital and citizenship to develop.

Capital will be quick to see the enormous advantages lying open for manufacturing enterprises whereby all these products may be shaped for human use at home at a minimum cost of manufacture and sent out through the Mississippi ports by way of the Canal for barter in Oriental markets, thus putting an end to the present wasteful policy by which Mississippi is selling the raw product to outside manufacturers who reap all the profits of commercial industry. These outsiders are now sending out all over the world the finished goods which eventually get back down South and are bought by Mississippians for an exorbitant price of which the retailer, the jobber, the manufacturer and all their cohorts of agents each gets a fair slice.

Mississippi products for Mississippi, and Mississippi for Mississippians will soon be the slogan sounded from "Yellow Rabbit to Vinegar Bend," with a warm welcome and a free share of statehood for every new settler who would enjoy the privilege of a part in the upbuilding of a sovereign State that is preordained to be the leading commonwealth in the greatest nation of the universe. Such is the primary purpose of the Centennial Exposition.

No section of the State, that will, be it ever so remote, can miss its share. The Nation, State, counties, and municipalities, are banding together in a supreme effort on this one hundredth anniversary that will prove an eye-opener to our own people and a revelation to those from other sections of the country.

RECOGNITION BY CONGRESS PROVES EXPOSITION'S WORTH

The prompt recognition given by our National Congress shows the importance to this whole country of the Mississippi Centennial Exposition. The National exhibit which was sent to California for the fair will be brought here at an expense to the United States Government of something like ninety thousand dollars.
