

### Executive Committee Meets

Freeman, and adopted by vote of the committee: Resolved that managers for each precinct be requested to post themselves on the primary election laws and be careful to let none but duly qualified Democratic electors vote in the coming Democratic primary, for which they are appointed as managers and officers.

Ordered that the committee adjourn to meet August 6th, 1919, at 10 o'clock P. M.

### Calcium Arsenate As a Fruit Spray

Owing to the advancing cost of Arsenate of Lead which has heretofore been the mainstay as a stomach poison against chewing insects which attack the fruit crops, efforts have been made to successfully substitute a cheaper source of poison than Arsenate of Lead. Because of the fact that Calcium Arsenate is a considerably cheaper product than Arsenate of Lead, the former product has received some attention from investigators and orchardist.

Commercial Calcium Arsenate may be either mono-basic, dibasic, or tri-basic, according to the calciums used as a base in its

composition. The mono-basic calcium arsenate is the most highly soluble in water and contains by far the largest amount of free Arsenic. Since it is the free Arsenic that causes the burning effect when applied to trees, often resulting in defoliation and since there is free Arsenic in the mono- and di-basic Calcium Arsenate, it will be readily seen that these substances must not be used as a spray upon foliage or fruit. Since the tri-basic Calcium Arsenate contains no free Arsenic, one may safely use this as a spray provided not more than one pound of the material is mixed with milk of lime from slaking 4 to 5 pounds of lime and this diluted to 50 gallons of water.

For the person who is not careful to determine which form of Calcium Arsenate he has, by far the safer course to pursue would be to buy the more expensive Arsenate of Lead and take no chances with burnt foliage. Anyone in doubt about the kind of Calcium Arsenate he might be informed by sending a sample to the Chemical Laboratory, Agricultural College, Mississippi and requesting this information.


