Radical Tricks.

The Radicals of this county have announced their programme and are laboring with all their strength to carry it out. They have instructed the negroes that they would send runners out a day or two before the election with their tickets to be distributed among them, and that they must not let any one see the tickets but march to the polls in solid phalanx and deposit their votes and let no one talk to them, and to go to the polls early and take possession of them and vote first.

These tricks are the same that was attempted to be played upon us in 1868 by these white Radical leaders, and the most determined effort must be made to defeat their control over the negroes.

The white Radicals are afraid to meet our party in open discussion, and have most ignominiously backed down in this county from discussing the issues of the canvass in joint debate, and have expressed their determination to prevent the Conservative speakers from having a hearing before a negro audience if they can prevent it.

On Saturday last at Pleasant Mount the Radicals refused to divide time, when the matter was submitted to them by the chairman of the executive committee on the day previous, but accepted our offer to divide time with them at Longtown, and on Saturday morning they said they would send speakers to Longtown to answer Major Chalmers and Captain Polk, but they failed to do so for fear of an ignominious route; and when our Conservative speakers followed their speakers to Pleasant Mount they refused any division of time until pushed to the wall, and then they consented to allow

forty minutes to open the discussion with no rejoinder against five speakers—Gen. Ames, Senator French, A. R. Howe, U. Quanne, and J. H. Piles, and the proposition was rejected as an insult. Such is Radical fairness. They dare not meet our party in joint discussion, and will never consent unless driven to the wall and forced to accept by a complication of circumstances, as was the case with M. C. Bradley accepting J. G. Hall, Jr.'s challenge to joint discussion at Com. The record of the Radical party cannot stand unimpaired before any audience, and they are afraid to let the negroes hear of their misdeeds, for fear they will lose control over them. But we are thankful that the negroes can be reached outside of their joint discussions, and that every

white man in the county is at work laboring successfully to convince the minds of the negroes of their misguided adherence to the Radical party, and the 7th day of November will carry up the swell of a victorious people's voice over the downfall of the wrecker's rule.

On the 25th inst., while Charles Dean was passing near the house of Sheriff Johnson, in Greenwood, Miss., he was fired at by concealed parties and instantly killed. An attempt was also made to kill Mr. Harry Mallin, who was in Dean's company, but it was happily frustrated. This is the second attempt to murder the latter. A man named Gibson was killed by the same band of murderers a few months ago.—Exchange.
