THE CHRONICLE-STAR.

The Chronicle having acquired by purchase the plant, business and good will of the Democrat-Star, will appear in the future as the Chronicle-Star, thus preserving the names of the two papers which have for so long been an intimate part of the history of the port of Pascagoula, Jackson county and South Mississippi.

The old Democrat was born away back in 1845 at Handsboro, Harrison county. Of its early history or just when it was acquired by the late Capt. P. K. Mayers, this writer is not informed. The Star of Pascagoula was established in 1873 by Col. Melancthon Smith and was published at the beach, Pascagoula and Scranton then being two distinct towns. The consolidation of the Democrat and Star took place March 28, 1878, Capt. Mayers then owning the Democrat-Star and moving it from Handsboro here, while M. B. Richmond was then owner of the Star, having succeeded Col. Smith in its ownership. The last owner of the Democrat-Star, Mr. W. T. Sparkman, acquired the paper about five years ago. The Chronicle was established Sept. 3, 1897, by Messrs. J. J. Tomasich and A. G. Osoinach. Mr. Osoinach sold his interest in the Chronicle to Mr. Tomasich soon after the Spanish-American war, and the present owner bought the paper from Mr. Tomasich in December, 1911.

This much for history. The purchase and consolidation of the Democrat-Star by the Chronicle was made necessary by the continued advance in operating expenses and the fact that two newspapers cannot longer be profitably operated in Pascagoula, covering as they do the same territory and drawing their support from the same sources.

The Chronicle-Star will do its utmost to publish a paper creditable to the port and the county. The measure of our success in this endeavor will be largely dependent upon the support accorded our efforts. This is a promise to do our best, and to this end we ask the united support of the patrons of both the Chronicle and Democrat-Star.

Mrs. Walter Weber of Mobile, spent the latter part of last week here with relatives.


Attorney W. M. Colmer was a visitor to Gulfport on Tuesday.

It is with some regret that I give up the paper, but other duties take the greater part of my time, and in business as well as in religious life, a man can not serve two masters. For five years I have endeavored to serve the interests of the readers of the Democrat-Star and the public of Pascagoula, and in many respects have succeeded. RESOLUTION.

Whereas it is found to be expedient that the owners of property abutting on streets paved and being paved be granted indulgence in making payment for their pro rata share of the cost of paving certain streets of city for a period of eight years on deferred annual payments, and that the issue of the bonds of the city for securing the funds to presently liquidate the cost of such paving levied against the abutting property owners will be necessary; be it therefore,

Resolved, that it be and is hereby declared by the city council of the City of Pascagoula to be the intent and purpose of the city council at the regular meeting of said council on the 5th day of October, 1920, without the express sanction of the electors of the city (unless on or before the date last aforesaid 20 per cent of the said qualified electors file a written protest against the same) to provide for and issue \$20,000 of the Street Paving Aid Bonds of the City of Pascagoula, or such an amount thereof, not exceeding \$20,000 par value, as may be required for the purpose aforesaid.

Resolved, further, that the clerk be directed to publish this resolution in the Pascagoula Chronicle, for three weeks next proceeding the date, aforesaid for authorizing issuance of said bonds.
