RESOLUTION.

Whereas it is found to be expedient that the owners of property abutting on streets paved and being paved be granted indulgence in making payment for their pro rata share of the cost of paving certain streets of city for a period of eight years on deferred annual payments, and that the issue of the bonds of the city for securing the funds to presently liquidate the cost of such paving levied against the abutting property owners will be necessary; be it therefore,

Resolved, that it be and is hereby declared by the city council of the City of Pascagoula to be the intent and purpose of the city council at the regular meeting of said council on the 5th day of October, 1920, without the express sanction of the electors of the city (unless on or before the date last aforesaid 20 per cent of the said qualified electors file a written protest against the same) to provide for and issue \$20,000 of the Street Paving Aid Bonds of the City of Pascagoula, or such an amount thereof, not exceeding \$20,000 par value, as may be required for the purpose aforesaid.

Resolved, further, that the clerk be directed to publish this resolution in the Pascagoula Chronicle, for three weeks next proceeding the date, aforesaid for authorizing issuance of said bonds.


