**THANKSGIVING MENUS.**

The following are menus not only suitable for a Thanksgiving dinner but ones that are made patriotic by the use of local and perishable foods. Let's not forget our obligation to Europe. The house wives can do much toward this if they will plan their meals largely of local and perishable foods. Every patriotic woman will be glad to do this.

Following are suggested as Mississippi Thanksgiving menus:

Smothered rabbit, creamed carrots, baked sweet potatoes, lettuce salad, corn bread, honey pudding.

Creamed potato soup, corn sticks, baked chicken, dressing, steamed squash, cabbage a la creme, sliced tomato salad, canned peaches and peanut cookies or persimmon pudding.

Roast turkey, jelly, potato bread, baked onions, radishes, escalloped tomatoes, apple and peanut salad, honey popcorn balls.

Baked fish, corn muffins, tomato sauce, baked peppers with rice and peanut stuffings, turnips, peas in potato cups, apple pudding, salted pecans.

**PROPOSALS WANTED FOR SANITARY SEWERAGE SYSTEM, STORM DRAINAGE AND STREET PAVING, PASCAGOULA, MISS.**

Sealed proposals will be received by the Mayor and Board of Aldermen, Pascagoula, Mississippi, on or before one p. m. on Tuesday, the 26th of November, 1918, and then publicly opened, for furnishing all materials, and constructing certain Sanitary Sewers, Storm Drainage and Street Improvements for the said City in accordance with plans and specifications on file in the City Hall at Pascagoula, Mississippi.

The Sanitary Sewer System will consist of Vitrified Sewer Pipe and Branches, Line Structures and Disposal Tank.

The Storm Sewers double strength Vitrified Sewer Pipe, Manholes and Catch Basins.

The Street Improvement will consist of approximately 62,500 cu. yds. of excavation and 26,750 sq. yds. of pavement, including the furnishing and constructing of curb and gutter, and storm drain inlets.

Each proposal must be accompanied by a certified check for three per cent (3%) of the amount of bid, made payable to F. D. Becht, Clerk, Pascagoula, Miss., as evidence of good faith.
