BOLSHEVISTS NOT WANTED.

They are invading the South. The recent federal raids, which gathered in thousands in the North, East and West, disclosed that they are already here. Twenty at Nashville and nine at Jacksonville, the only Southern cities where raids were ordered. There are doubtless some of them here and in neighboring cities and ports. It behooves the people and state to cooperate with the federal government in cleaning them out.

It is the duty of every good citizen, without regard to political, religious or fraternal affiliations, to do his duty and stand by the officers of the law, federal, state and municipal, and see to it that none of these find an abiding place here or elsewhere in our sunny South.

The charge of District Judge Grayson of Mobile to the grand jury in that county is deserving of the strongest commendation and is reproduced herewith:

"Disrespect for law and constituted authority is rich fertilizer for the seeds of anarchy, and furnishes nourishing food for the enemies of our state. Let us not fall into the error of leaving this question solely and exclusively to the federal authorities. Our state constitution provides that one who adheres to the enemies of the state, or gives them aid and comfort, is guilty of treason, which is punishable by death or imprisonment in the penitentiary for life. It is unnecessary to sit back sullenly and await the stamping out of anarchy in all its forms by the federal authorities. Put the machinery of the law in motion by indicting violators of the law, thereby commanding their respect, and the result will maintain and perpetuate the majesty of the law, and deplete the ranks of the followers of the red flag."

Indignation Meeting Warns I. W. W. To Stay Away.

Quitman, Miss., Jan. 6.—An indignation meeting attended by practically every representative citizen of the town was held here today as a preventive measure against any organizer of or sympathizer with the I. W. W. cause coming to this town. Literature in the possession of the chairman showed that Quitman figures in the propaganda that the I. W. W. are sending out as one of the towns in their itinerary to be visited.

Stinging resolutions were passed, winding up with one clothed in the following significant words: "Resolved further, That if it comes to the ears of the vigilance committee that any citizen or visitor to the town who is heard of talking in any way that would indicate that he is in sympathy in the least with the I. W. W. cause, that he be given just ten minutes to get out of town, or suffer the consequences."

Ring speeches, which told that the people are thoroughly aroused and determined were delivered by Attorneys Anderson and Adams, Circuit Clerk McNeal, Dr. Donald, Banker Dabbs and Dr. Watkins Anderson.

PORT NEWS NOTES.

The U. S. Lighthouse tender Camella was in port this week on the quarterly inspection of the Horn Island and Round Island lighthouses and river range lights. These stations were supplied with oils and rations.

ORDINANCE NO. 23, 1920.

An Ordinance Entitled an Ordinance to authorize the purchase of a plat or parcel of land adjoining the present lot and site of the public wharf and docks of the city on the south for the enlargement of the ground space of the said wharf and docks, and authorizing payment of the purchase money for the purchase of same.

Be it ordained by the city council of the city of Pascagoula, Mississippi: Section 1. That the Mayor of the city be, and he is hereby authorized to purchase of Hunter Benn & Company, the owners thereof, that certain tract or parcel of land in said city particularly described as follows, to-wit: Beginning at the intersection of the north line of the Foster place with the east bank of the Pascagoula river, thence S 31 degrees and 30 min. E. along the north line of the Foster property 200 feet, thence N. 3 E. to the southeast corner of the property conveyed to the city of Pascagoula by Hunter Benn & Company August 10th, 1915, described in deed book 41, page 555, thence west along the south line of the above mentioned property 200 feet to Pascagoula river, thence south along the east margin of said river to the place of beginning, and for the price of seven thousand (\$7,000) dollars, which said tract or parcel of land when so purchased will become and be appropriated and used as part of the ground space and premises of the public wharf and docks belonging to and about to be constructed by the city of Pascagoula for which purpose said land is required for enlargement of the said wharf and dock site.

Section 2. That when said lands shall be so purchased and conveyed to the city as authorized by section one hereof, the warrant of the city for the purchase price so authorized shall be issued payable out of the funds derived from the sale of the public wharf and dock bonds.

Section 3. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its approval, publication and enrollment as provided by law.

ORDINANCE NO. 22, 1920.

An Ordinance entitled an ordinance authorizing and providing for the purchase from E. J. Ford of that portion of lots 6 and 7, block 5 of the Frederic Tract in said city surveyed as part of the right-of-way of a switch connecting the L. & N. R. R. with the city wharf and docks on Pascagoula river, and providing for payment therefor.

Be it ordained by the city council of the city of Pascagoula, Mississippi: Section 1. That for the purpose of providing a part of the right-of-way for the construction of a switch track to connect the city wharf and docks on Pascagoula river with the L. & N. Railroad on or near Frederic street in said city, the mayor of the city be, and he is hereby authorized to negotiate for the purchase of the owner, Mr. E. J. Ford, that portion of lots 6 and 7 of block 5 of the Frederic tract of land in said city, which tract of land on block 5 lies and adjoins Frederic street on the west and the north line of Deimas avenue of which a plat is of record in plat book 1 at page 6 on file in the office of the chancery clerk of said county, which part or parcel has been

GOVERNMENT IS AFTER REDS

Treasury Secret Service Immigration Inspectors, Customs Officers, Join Forces Already Searching Out Anarchists.

Washington, Jan. 7.—Complete co-ordination of all governmental agencies tonight had given the campaign to rid the nation of radicals a broader aspect. While Assistant Attorney General Garvan's force continued its raids including a search for Ludwig C. A. K. Martens, self-styled envoy of the Russian soviet government, there were evidence of new activity and more determined co-operation in all other departments of the government.

Congress received a bill, introduced by Representative Johnson, Republican, Washington, which would make every government employe an agent for ferreting out undesirable. Each clerk would be given the duty of reporting any information concerning alien activities to the department of justice and the immigration authorities. Representative Johnson said his bill would have the double purpose of ridding government departments of persons described as "trouble breeders" as well as providing a greater net work for the trapping of all dangerous persons.

Make Room For Prisoners. The treasury secret service with its wide ramifications was enlisted in running down persons for whom the immigration authorities have issued warrants. Customs officials also have been asked to report any information they gather in the work of inspecting imports, while the army and navy intelligence arms of service will co-operate both in the gathering of evidence and searching out of radicals.
