PORT NEWS NOTES.

In order to meet the growing needs of the shipping interests of the port of Pascagoula, Congress will be urged to make a liberal appropriation for the Gulf Coast of Mississippi. Deeper water is required in the ship channel from Moss Point to the passes. Pascagoula is strictly a natural deep water port and protected harbor and is recognized as the leading point on the Gulf of Mexico for a great maritime harbor.

Callao, Peru, is one of the promising ports of South America now opening business relations with the port of Pascagoula. The American S. S. G. A. Flagg, freighted with 1,700,000 superficial feet of pitch pine will sail early next week for the Peruvian port.

Capt. H. H. Colle of the Gulf Ship Co., and port captain for the L. N. Dantzer Lumber Co., has given up all hope of floating the schooner Griffin, which will prove a total loss on Pett Bois Island.

The following vessels are in port receiving lumber cargoes: Susie B. Dantzer, Gabriel Palmer, Delta, M. A. Achorn and G. A. Flagg.

Coastwise tow boats are frequently entering the port for coal and fuel. Special Customs Agent Stone of New Orleans was among Thursday's port visitors.

The American schooner Susie B. Dantzer, Capt. F. Dethloff, arrives in port Monday four days from Progresso, Mexico. The Captain reports the loss of the deck load of lumber on the outward trip, encountering heavy weather.

Capt. Emile Fremont of the American schooner Pat Harrison came Sunday from Gulfport to visit his children and close friends. This Gulf Coast built schooner sailed from Norfolk to Porto, Mexico, arriving at Gulfport Saturday.

The U. S. dredge Gulfport, Capt. E. C. Smith, chief engineer Gale Curry, E. Fredom and Stanton Dean, arrived at Gulfport Saturday from Mobile in tow of the tug Tuscaloosa, Capt. W. J. Colle. The major part of the crew are residents of this port.

Resolved, that, for the purchase of material and the expense of construction of such water and light plant, it is now declared to be the purpose and intention of the city council to issue the interest bearing coupon bonds of the city to an amount that may be required for the purpose of the construction of such water and light plant not exceeding the total amount of \$125,000 par value to be issued and sold in that manner now provided by law, the proceeds of which to be used to pay for the purchase of a site and for material and labor for the construction and completion of such water and light plant to be owned and operated by the city as aforesaid. Be it further,

Resolved, that an election be held at the several voting places in said city within legal hours for regular elections on the 27th day of May, 1920, and that F. L. Lindinger, F. J. Johnson and W. W. Walker be and they are hereby appointed election commissioners for holding and conducting such election and F. L. Lindinger is designated for having the tickets printed to be used thereat.

Resolved further, that at the said election the ballots to be used shall be substantially in words and figures as follows:

Shall the issuance of the coupon bonds of the city in an amount not exceeding \$125,000.00 for raising money for the construction of a municipal water works and light plant for supplying water and lights for the inhabitants of the city as proposed by the council to be authorized.

Resolved, That it be and is hereby declared by the city council of the city of Pascagoula to be the intent and purpose of the city council, at a regular meeting of said council on the 19th day of May, 1920, without the approval of the electors of the city (unless on or before the date last aforesaid 20% of the said qualified electors file a written protest against the same) provide for and issue \$10,000.00 of the public school building and repair bonds of the city of Pascagoula in an amount not exceeding \$10,000.00 par value, in the form and manner provided by law in such cases.

Resolved further, that this ordinance be published in the Pascagoula Chronicle for three weeks next preceding the date of issuance as herein provided for the issuance of said bonds.
