## BANK MEETING.

Pursuant to advertisement, there was a meeting of the subscribers for stock in the Mississippi Union Bank (who reside in Amite county) held at the Court House in said county on the 17th inst. Upon the meeting being organized, David Lea, Esq., who had been delegated by a previous meeting to visit Jackson and there attend to the interests of the subscribers for stock in said Bank who reside in Amite county, made the following report, and then submitted two letters for inspection.

Mr. Chairman.—In pursuance of a resolution of the meeting of the subscribers for stock in the Mississippi Union Bank, on Saturday the 26th day of October last, requesting that I should visit the mother Bank at Jackson, for the purpose of there ascertaining the situation of our title papers, as well as obtaining such other information relating to said Bank and its operations as I might think would be of interest to the citizens of this county generally, and particularly to those who have subscribed for stock in said Bank; and, sir, for the purpose of saving time and bringing the information which I have been able to procure fairly before this meeting, I beg leave to submit the correspondence which took place between myself and the President of said Bank on all the subjects which I thought would be of immediate interest to them; together with the further information that the mother Bank has, since I left Jackson, employed eight assistants in the law department of said institution, for the purpose of completing the examination of all the papers relative to stock, in as short a time as possible, so as to enable the mother Bank to establish the branches during the ensuing spring; all of which is respectfully submitted for the reception or rejection of this meeting.

Dear Sir:—On Saturday last, the citizens of Amite county, who have subscribed for stock in the Mississippi Union Bank, held a meeting in the town of Liberty, for the purpose of devising some means whereby they might ascertain the situation of their papers relative to the aforesaid stock; and by a resolution of the said meeting, requested that I should visit this place for the purpose of obtaining the desired information, respecting the validity of our title papers, as well as obtaining all other information on the subject of the Bank and its operations, as I might think would afford them satisfaction in the cases above alluded to; and for the purpose of accomplishing the aforesaid objects, I respectfully ask the necessary answers to the following questions:

- 1st. Will our title papers and certificates of appraisement want any thing more done to them here; if so, how and where made?
- 2d. About what time is it probable our papers will be returned, for the purpose of consummating the mortgages?
- 3d. Will or will not the 21 per cent. be required of the stockholders at the time of executing their mortgages?
- 4th. About what time is it probable the branches will be established in the different districts,—any thing like particularity of time, to this interrogatory, is not expected?
- 5th. Does the Bank here sell checks on the principal cities in the other States; if so, at what per cent?
- 6th. Would it meet the approbation of the directory of the mother Bank, for the subscribers of stock in the county of Amite to recommend a certain number of persons who they might think best qualified to manage the directory of the branch at Liberty, and if they should approve of such a course, what number should Amite recommend?
- 7th. Will the grading of the stock be general throughout the State, or by districts; and will it be made under the 2d section of the original charter, or under the amended charter?

I hope, sir, the foregoing interrogatories will meet the earliest attention you and the Board over which you have the honor to preside can bestow, consistently with your other obligations; and the only apology I have to offer for intruding upon your time, which I know is worth so much, is the anxiety those I represent feel on the subject.
